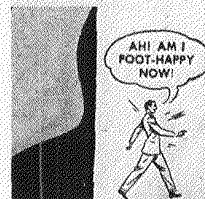

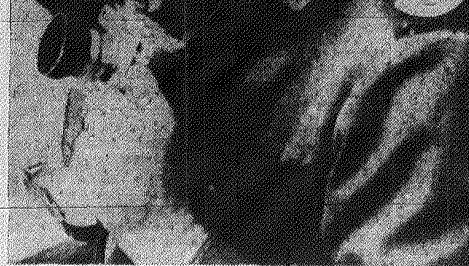

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F. R. Admonishes Pacific War Council Against 'Loose Talk'

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—
Members of the Pacific War Coun-
cil got a "lecture" from President
Roosevelt today on the dangers of
loose talk that might be of aid to
the enemy.

They said all agreed there "was
such a danger, although they in-
sisted that no special instances had
given rise to the emphasis placed
on the subject of today's council
meeting. Nor was any one Govern-
ment, individual, or newspaper
singled out for criticism," they said.
Leighton McCarthy, Canada's rep-
resentative on the council, said that
the members "got a lecture" on the
"urgent necessity for all of us to
be careful in what we say."

Dr. T. V. Soong, China's foreign
minister, flanked by the British
Ambassador, Lord Halifax, re-
marked that the council's delibera-

tions stressed a "general warning of
the importance of using extreme
discretion when a military operation
is about to be undertaken."

"We all believe that there is
danger of too much loose talk that
will give away information of real
value to the enemy."

Asked whether there was "any-
thing new" on the China front,
Soong replied that "our troops are
still in Burma and we will prevent
(Japanese) consolidations there."
