August, 1941, was 3,954.

The council said the increase
was attributed, in part, to the
fact there were five Saturday's
in August this year, including
one during the Labor Day
weekend.

Despite the increased toll in
August, the council said high-
way deaths for the first eight
months this year were 2 per
cent lower compared to the
corresponding period last year.
24,730 against 25,200.

The council reported that
travel in the first six months
was up 3 per cent, producing
5.5 deaths for every 100,000
miles of travel, lowest ratio
in the Nation's history for a
comparable period.

Arabs Face Food Crisis

BEIRUT (Lebanon), Sept. 30.—
(AP)—Director Henry La-
brousse of the U. N. Relief and
Works Agency (UNRWA) left
for New York today with a
warning that his agency faces a
financial crisis threatening
hundreds of thousands of Arab
refugees with starvation.

Unless voluntary contribu-
tions from nations are forth-
coming before the year's end,
UNRWA operations must halt
and a new, extremely ugly sit-
uation would be in prospect
for the Arab Mideast with
frightening political overtones,
he said.

Labrousse is scheduled to ad-
dress the Assembly Friday on
the financial position of
UNRWA.

CASH RUNNING OUT.

The situation is such as of
Dec. 31 the agency will not
have enough cash in hand to
continue operations. Unless
actual cash—not pledges—is
in hand operations must halt.
UNRWA provides a bare
subsistence diet for 842,300
Arab Palestine war refugees
in countries surrounding Is-
rael. If UNRWA fails to get
the money, an agency spokes-
man said, 600,000 or more
Arabs face starvation.

Labrousse has recently been
on a tour of North America
and Europe explaining UN-
RWA work to member govern-
ments and urging noncontribu-
tors to join in. Only 31 of 82
U. N. members contributed to
the 1957 budget. The United
States gives 70 per cent, with
Britain the next largest con-
tributor. Others give relatively
small amounts. Yugoslavia is

This is the beginning of
what will eventually be a 600-

DESPERATE SITUATION.

The UNRWA position was
described as desperate. As of
Dec. 31, it will have cash
totaling \$3,800,000 for relief
work and \$2,400,000 for re-
habilitation work.

The budget for 1958 en-
visions \$25,700,000 for relief
plus \$15,000,000 for rehabili-
tation. Half this cash must be
in hand, Jan. 1, the other half
July 1. UNRWA cannot con-
tinue operation. There is not
enough cash left to order
goods, equipment or contract
for employe services ahead of
time.

Expenditures remain about
the same from year to year
to keep Arab refugees going
at a level including a bare
subsistence of 1,500 calories a
day per person except for
medical and motherhood
cases.
