My dear Edgar:

Thanks for your letter of September 25. I shall be very grateful to you for getting together the material of the distribution and concentration of lead. Take all the time you wish to prepare it, for a great deal of our work will not be started before December and the report will not be completed for several months after that. I wish to take a sufficient amount of time with this study to cover everything we can find of any significance, as I stated before in the hope that we might complete the job this time. However, I would be glad if you would send me when it is convenient a group of the principal cities which in your opinion offer the best opportunity for us to find the largest amount of gasoline used and the highest concentration. I have made a tentative list of cities in which we will attempt to find garage mechanics, and we are already beginning to look for them. I should like to have your list as sort of a check on my own, so that we may not overlook any really important points. I want to select these as representative of the conditions in all parts of the country and I want to pick the particular place for each general district that best serves our purpose.

Thanks very much for having the iron carbonyl made up for me. I am very much interested in seeing how this experiment will turn out. Kindest regards.
