Lamson Again Questioned

David Lamson took the stand
briefly early in the afternoon to
be questioned by the state regard-
ing one of his expense vouchers.
The voucher, made out for March
19 to 25, 1933, detailed expenses
including a visit in Fresno on a
day when he was actually at Stan-
ford University acting as secretary
for a meeting of the Stanford
Press executives.

The defendant said that his

Friend, manager of the Press.

Sacramento, but did not list that
city on his expense voucher.
