Dear Doctor Vorwald:

I am fully sympathetic with the expressions in your letter of August 1, 1947, to me.

It seems to me that now that you are permanently at Saranac and will carry on the work, the use and publication of Dr. Gardner's material should be primarily in your hands. Particularly does this appear to me logical and best in view of your expression about the effect of other accumulated evidence in your possession.

I, therefore, propose that you and Dr. Lanza consider the matter from that viewpoint and feel entirely free to proceed as your combined judgment dictates in the best interest of the work itself. I recently sent the edited manuscript to Dr. Lanza with a suggestion about the publication. I now believe that this should be reviewed from the viewpoint of the expression in your present letter to me.
