Inform-

kindergarten and first grade pupils will take place in all elementary schools in that city May 21-26 from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. daily except Saturday when hours will be 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

Ages for eligibility to register remain four years and six months if the child is to reach that age by March 1.

A new legislation now awaiting the signature of the governor will change the age to four years and nine months but will not become effective until Sept. 22.

Children who enter kindergarten in the coming year will not be taken out of class when the age change goes into effect, 91 days after close of the legislature.

Children entering the first grade must be five years and six months of age. (When the new ruling goes through the age will be advanced to five years and nine months of age.)

In either case birth certificates or a hospital record must be submitted for birth date verification.
