During Mrs. Shelby's testimony before the Grand Jury, which was preceded by that of her two daughters, Miss Minter and Mrs. Margaret Fillmore, the mother recalled she had the gun in her possession at the time of the Taylor shooting but did not recall what happened to it afterward.

The mother named Harry Eaves, Santa Barbara jeweler, as donor of the gun. He is to be interviewed by the investigators if he can be located.

"We owned considerable jewelry at the time," Mrs. Shelby explained. "We had purchased some of it from Eaves and he told me I should have the gun for protection."

GRANDMOTHER INVOLVED.

A report that Mrs. Shelby had given the gun to her late mother, Mrs. Mary Branch Miles, who disposed of it, was said to have been given the Grand Jury by Mrs. Fillmore, who is estranged from Mrs. Shelby, her mother.

Mrs. Shelby's only comment on that report was she did not know what happened to the gun which disappeared around the time of Taylor's death.

San Leandro's Traffic Safe

SAN LEANDRO, May 7.—Loss of life in this city through automobile accidents was revealed in an accident report involving injuries released today by Captain A. J. Lamoureux of the Police Department.

This year to date, 17 accidents have occurred with 20 injured and one killed. Records of previous years revealed that during 1934-35 accidents occurred with 68 injured and none killed; 1935, 52 accidents, 76 injured, one killed; 1936, 45 accidents, 63 injured, two killed.

Strict enforcement of traffic laws and the curbing of speeding in this city have aided in sustaining minimum accidents, according to Captain Lamoureux.

Philippine Clipper May Fly Saturday

The Philippine Clipper, which was originally scheduled to leave Alameda Tuesday afternoon with passengers and mail for Hong Kong will probably take-off tomorrow.

Unfavorable weather reports over the Pacific forced another delay today.

The storm area is clearing and a take-off tomorrow appears likely, said Pan American Airways officials.

Picket Fined \$25

RICHMOND, May 7.—Owen R. Wilcox of Berkeley, Warehousemen's Union picket convicted of disturbing the peace, was fined \$25 and given suspended sentence of 90 days by Police Judge C. A. Odell today.

Wilcox was convicted by a jury of creating a disturbance at the Filice and Pericelli Cannery while engaged in picketing.

Camp Richardson Dining Hall Burns

TAHOE CITY, May 7.—The Camp Richardson dining room building was destroyed by fire today. The loss was estimated at \$20,000. The camp hotel and store building burned to the ground six months ago, and new structures are nearing completion. Origin of the dining room blaze was not determined. The Lake Tahoe camp is owned by A. L. Richardson.

MACON EFFECT
