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in Ireland, France, and England,
and a board of directors repre-
senting most of the free world
countries.

Mrs. Pavlo declared her or-
ganization believes that women
have the power to bring about
the federation her group ad-
vocates.

"Isolationists are playing into
the hands of the Reds," she de-
clared, decrying the dangerous
signs of disunity among the
free nations of the world. She
cited British recognition of Red
China and the increasing trade
with Russia by free western
powers, which she declared
were further evidences they

are giving comfort and aid to
Russia in her aim to divide and
conquer without having to
fight."

She predicted that Russia
would be unable to challenge
such a federation, since it would
possess 80 per cent of the
world's industrial potential, and
declared that Americans must
lead the way to such a federa-
tion, similar to the one the 13
original states formed in the
early days of the republic.

Dr. Elliot Blackwelder, Stan-
ford emeritus geology professor
and head of Atlantic Union for
this area, presided at the meet-
ing, which took place at the
Stanford Union.

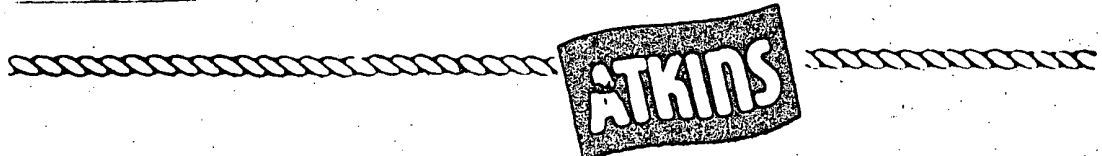
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
