SUBJECT: DUST CONTROL AT TWO PUNCH AND PUNCH

I. PROJECT

It is proposed to install dust collection heads at two Niagara Punch presses at the south end of "W" Building in order to protect the safety and health of the employees.

II. PROJECT FACILITIES

Provision for dust collection does not exist at these presses. Previous to January 1958 these presses punched shingles which had been air cured and washed, causing no dust problem. However, beginning with January, American Method #50's have been punched on the Niagara. Since these are normal core shingles, being punched before steam curing and washing, they have caused this dust problem.

It is now proposed to install dust collection heads at the presses and connect them to the dust collection system having the water repellent applicator, the air cleaner and the transite saw.

III. TYPE OF PROJECT

This is a project to protect the safety and health of employees.

IV. ESTIMATED CAPITAL EXPENDITURE FOR PROJECT:

Fabricate and install dust collection heads at 2 punch presses	\$405

V. OTHER INVESTMENT

VI. BENEFITS

1. Improved protection of safety and health through dust control for 18 men who operate the punch presses and 50 more men at the nearby air cleaner, water repellent machine and transite saw. Operations are in progress 24 hours per day throughout the work week. Continuous complaints as to dust around the south end presses and nearby machines will be met in accord with plant management's assurance as to analysis and correction.

V. SUMMARY (CONTINUED)

2. Compliance with dust concentration limits for this type exposure as specified by the Industrial Hygiene Department of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. The actual concentration is equal to that of the north end process, or 21.5 million parts per cubic foot of air whereas specified is five million.

VII. TIME TO COMPLETE PROJECT

Estimated time to complete - 3 weeks
Estimated downtime - none
Estimated life - 20 years

VIII. RECOMMENDATIONS

The contents of dust at the punch process are asbestos, silica, cement, slate and limestone, a serious exposure.

A disability resulting from this exposure under the present law is compensable in the approximate amount of \$2000. Existing New Jersey law is contained in Chapter 15, Title 14 of the Revised Statutes (P.L. 1941 c 88) and as amended.

The compensation in the suggested revision of this law would increase the award to between \$13,000 and \$28,000 in New Jersey. The revised law is now in committee with passage anticipated in 1951.

Therefore, in order to avoid consequences of continuing with inadequate equipment and in order to secure benefits of Section VI, early approval of this project is recommended.

INDUSTRIAL HYGIENE

In the last several years, there has been considerable increase in knowledge concerning many industrial materials and processes and their relation to the health of the worker. Many new materials have introduced new problems of industrial hygiene, but there has been progress, too, in the techniques of exposure determination and control.

It has long been our policy to provide safe, healthful working conditions throughout Johns-Manville. In order to determine the extent of industrial hygiene exposures, a survey service by Johns-Manville personnel is now available to all locations.

Since industrial hygiene surveys provide objective measurements for interpreting exposure hazard, efficiency of existing control systems, necessity for new control capacity or design, general plant surveys should be made at least annually. Equipment installation, process revision, material substitution affecting exposure potential would indicate necessity for additional samplings.

The plant manager desiring the survey will address his request for such service to the appropriate location from which a technician is available.

I am finally in a position to reply to your letter of August 31st, addressed to all members of the Hygiene Foundation, requesting certain information regarding non-occupational sickness and accident indemnification plans.

Enclosed you will find one of our so-called "policy" folders which contains the Company's policy on group health and accident insurance. This is one of a group of brochures provided each employee and which outline the Company's policy on various matters. I believe this is the only literature we have descriptive of our accident and health insurance.

On the form that accompanied your letter we have provided certain of the information you have requested. The questions relating to the number of cases of disability for which payment was made and the number of days of lost time we have been unable to supply, since the Company does not keep records of this type and Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., our carrier, has indicated that, due to the shortage of clerical assistance, they are unable to compile the information. I believe Metropolitan received similar requests from several companies and that they communicated with you concerning the subject.

Subject: INSURANCE INTERROGATORY REQUESTING INFORMATION REGARDING
INDUSTRIAL HYGIENE DEPARTMENT TESTING PRIOR TO 1952

The following data lists the dates, plant locations, and persons performing the outside surveys prior to 1952. It should be noted that some of the Travelers surveys were actually performed by some of our people and analyzed by the Travelers Insurance Company Laboratories.
