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Dear doctor:

Unless I am mistaken, you have written an article dealing with the effects on the central nervous system, and particularly concerning cases which manifest tonic-clonic seizures.

I, at the present time, have a man under my care who is forty five years of age who had lead poisoning about a year ago. Prior to that time, history does not show any history of epilepsy.

In the last year and a half he has had several tonic-clonic seizures which ordinarily would be taken to be epilepsy. He has had two attacks in the last ten days. Without warning he loses consciousness and goes into a severe spasmodic attack at the mouth and then within a period of fifteen minutes becomes himself again. There is no evidence of lead in the urine and there is nothing in the blood count to indicate the presence of lead in his system. I have been able to make a positive diagnosis.
