Sutter Packing Company to install screens to prevent clogging of sewers

As a means of more effectively removing heavier solids before wastes from the cannery are poured into the city's sewage disposal lines, the Sutter Packing Company is installing two finer revolving screens than used here before.

For this operation, which includes excavation and construction, the company has just been issued a building permit for \$6,000. Wells P. Goodenough is the contractor.

The heavy solids, such as tomato skins and peach pits, will continue to be hauled by truck from the cannery to the city dumps.

This procedure minimizes clogging of the sewage disposal lines and overburdening the plant which already is forced to carry a capacity load; in fact, there are times when the plant cannot handle the volume of sewage, a fact which is responsible for the city's giving one of its highest priority ratings to the proposal to proceed as soon as possible with the construction of facilities doubling the capacity of the existing plant.
