**SUNDAY BEST -- CHRIS WALLACE** had an exclusive interview with **REINCE PRIEBUS** on **"FOX NEWS SUNDAY" -- PRIEBUS :** "The fact of the matter is there are sometimes in life you've got to do what's right not what's politically expedient. We believe this is going to be a better product and by the time people see that the premiums are lower, there's a better service, there's more options and more choices, they're going to reward the Republicans that sit up and said, we are not going to see the Obamacare system, which is failing and collapsing continue any longer, we're going to do something better, and we are going to do our job as legislatures to get this thing done. I think that the Republican Party will be rewarded."

**"THIS WEEK" -- STEPHANOPOULOS:** "As you know, the Democrats got wiped out in 2010 after voting on Obamacare. It's one of the reasons you're speaker today, over time. They smell real blood now. You saw Leader Pelosi. And on Friday, the Cook Political Report, well-respected, shifted 20 seats away from the GOP. Here's what their analyst Dave Wasserman said, he said: 'House Republicans' willingness to spend political capital on a promise -- on a proposal that garnered the support of just 17 percent of the public in a March Quinnipiac poll is consistent with past scenarios that have generated a midterm wave.' How worried are you about a midterm wave? What are you telling your members?"

**RYAN:** "I'm not. Number one, health care is a complicated and very emotional personal issue. And we completely understand that. The system is failing. We're stepping in front of it and rescuing people from a collapsing system.

**"And more importantly** , we're keeping our word. That's really important here, George. People expect their elected leaders, if they run and campaign on doing something, they expect them to do that. And that's what we're doing. We're keeping our word. And I would argue that we would spell disaster for ourselves, politically, if that's your question, if we go back on our word. This is us keeping our word. But most importantly, it's us trying to fix a real problem that real people are experiencing in this country."

**-- ANDREA MITCHELL** talks with **HHS SECRETARY TOM PRICE** on **NBC'S "MEET THE PRESS" -- MITCHELL:** "Well, let's talk about women. I mean, when we looked at the Rose Garden and the celebration of this on Thursday, they were mostly all men and white men at that. There was no diversity there. Obamacare includes maternity and newborn care, preventive care, mammograms, cervical cancer screenings, birth control, all of this under the essential package, no longer required under this House bill."
