This report follows that of January 19, inaugurating the reporting service on legislation related to matters of health and safety. Federal legislation is now included.

To amend the Water Pollution Control Act to increase the amount authorized to be appropriated for making loans to States, municipalities, and interstate agencies for the construction of treatment works and for the preparation of engineering reports, plans, and specifications in connection therewith. Smoke Control. Extends smoke abatement authority of municipalities three miles beyond borders. Introduced Jan. 17.

OREGON 8.9

Air Pollution (Report #2) Sanitary Authority may develop comprehensive program for prevention, control and abatement of new and existing sources of air pollution; also conduct studies, promulgate and enforce rules and regulations, etc. Authority has power of entry except private dwellings.
