

## Saloonmen Before Commissioners on Charges of Breaking the Law

The Police Commissioners also heard the cases of eight saloons kept charged with violating the law prohibiting buck knives and private entertainings. The chief complaint was that they harbored women. In the case of Hoffman & Cron, Golden street, Myrtle and Webster street, the complaint was dismissed upon the promise not to serve liquor to any woman.

In the other cases Attorney J. Murphy, who represented the keepers, promised only that the court would bar out women who were known to be bad. The cases were continued until the next session, for defendants were to be tried at Franklin street, in the Golden Gate avenue Municipal Building, 1025 Golden Gate avenue, San Francisco. 427 Golden Gate avenue, San Francisco, 855 Golden Gate avenue, Ballings & Bond, 1025 Golden Gate avenue and Laguna street and James J. Stack, 1161 Golden Gate avenue, Eugene, Ore., were to be tried there at Pioneer Hall, Golden Gate avenue and Octavia street was on trial for conducting disorderly games. His case will be decided today.

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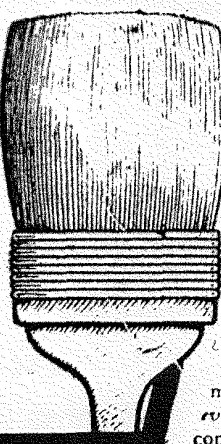
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
