Dear Mr. Bevan:

Enclosed is copy of the letter we are sending to the Commonwealth Oil Refineries Ltd. today and a copy of the agreement which we have signed in triplicate. There may be a few debatable matters contained in Exhibit "A" but in the actual working of the agreement I doubt that any of it will be the source of any difficulty or misunderstanding. Certainly we are entering into this contract under the assumption that we are dealing with the responsible officials with whom I had the pleasure of coming in contact in connection with the negotiations with Anglo Persian Oil Company and I do not entertain the slightest doubt but that we will proceed with the C.O.R. contract substantially in the spirit which we have operated with Anglo Persian under the contract with them.

It would seem to me that it was unnecessary for us to specify "COR Plus" as the name under which their treated gasoline should be sold. That is left wide open as the contract now stands, subject of course to the limitations which are set forth in the agreement (including Exhibit "A"). In the attempt to give proper consideration to the matters relating to medical supervision, mixing installations, general handling of full, partially empty and empty drums, transportation, the mixing itself and the tagging of pumps, it is my opinion that they may better be handled through your contact with Anglo Persian there in London. You are and doubtless will be throughout the life of the contract in more intimate association with every phase of it than we can possibly be here and I would like for you to feel that these matters are just as much your responsibility as if they were actually taking place in the United Kingdom and I am sure you appreciate with this view on my part the necessity of C.O.R. carrying on every phase of this business with the same prudence and scrupulous care as any other customer, irrespective of location.

Needless to say, it is just as important that no part of this piece of business should be overlooked and in particular that which bears any relationship to possible health hazards involved as any other business we have.
