TOKYO, Apr. 2—(Monday)—
Onsa. Allied forces pushed their line today to positions either on or just south of the 38th Parallel after a tank-led killer patrol landed into North Korea Sunday.
The patrol, which remained across the border near Yangyang northwest of Uijongbu for an hour, returned to American lines under a screen of artillery fire.
This marked the third crossing of the controversial boundary and was followed by another penetration to the parallel by an armored column northwest of Chunchon. The Communists continued their

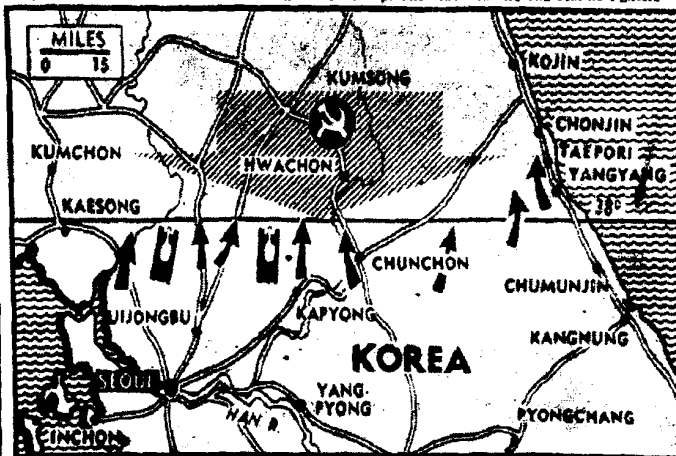
spring offensive.
INS War Correspondent Cecil Brownlow reported that the American armored column duelled with Communists north of the border, killing 15 and wounding 20 Reds before returning to their own lines.
An enemy patrol Monday morning attempted to cross the Imjin River near Seupo, about three miles south of the parallel but was driven back by Allied fire.
Sunday a United Nations patrol received enemy fire one mile south of the parallel near the village of Songchon in the same vicinity.
Minefields were also discovered planted during Sunday night by enemy troops along the Sinchon River as far as six miles south of the parallel. The Sinchon flows

eight miles north of the 38th Parallel. The Sinchon flows into the sea at the mouth of the Imjin River near Seupo, about three miles south of the parallel but was driven back by Allied fire.

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2 Runaway Boys Cross to Catalina In 14-ft. Boat

Two teen-age runaways, subject of a combined search by Long Beach Juvenile Bureau officers, Catalina Island police and the U. S. Coast Guard, were found on the western end of the island last night. They were taken into custody by Avalon police.
The two, Daniel Lee, 13, of 108 Claremont Ave., and Jimmy Hayden, 16, of 6133 Eastbrook Ave., Bellflower, made the journey from Alamitos Bay to the island yesterday in a 14-foot motor-powered boat. Coast Guardsmen said the trip could easily have been fatal for both boys.
A Coast Guard search plane spotted the boat at the west end of the island shortly before dusk. Avalon police found the two boys several hours later.

Peach Tree's Nearly As Good as a Pillow

A peach tree yesterday broke the fall of Arthur Fitzpatrick, 61, of 1850 Pacific Ave., from a second-story window, preventing possible fatal injuries.
Fitzpatrick was cleaning the window when he lost his balance and fell, according to police reports. He landed in a peach tree, the fore of the fall driving a twig two inches long and one inch in diameter into his right forearm.
The twig was removed at Seaside Hospital.

Ex-L.B. Officer Killed by Shell

Services were being arranged yesterday for 1st Lt. Arnold E. Zielke, 30, formerly of Long Beach, killed at Ft. Ord Saturday in a training accident.
Zielke, who formerly lived at 387 1/2 Grand Ave., died after being struck by fragments of a 105 mm. howitzer shell which fell short of its target.
A World War II veteran, he is survived by his widow and two daughters, all of Ft. Ord.

Red Strikes Spread, 12,000 Idle in Iran Oil Fields

TEHRAN, Iran, Apr. 1—(AP)—Native office workers have joined Communist-led strikes, spreading through the rich oil-producing region of Southern Iran and nearly 12,000 persons are idle, a spokesman for the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. said today.

At the same time, an official source said trade between Iran and Russia "is not going at all well" and that the work of both the Border and Reparations Commissions is practically at a standstill.

Russia's attitude toward Iran was reported to have "hardened" since the assassination last month of Premier Ali Razmzari, who opposed nationalization of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. Informed sources said Parliament later approved the nationalization.

British Defense Minister Emanuel Shinwell warned Iran bluntly today not to violate the oil agreement, which is supposed to run until 1953 in a speech at Blackhall, Colliers, England, he said. "The specter of twisting the British lion's tail might produce undesirable results."

Last week the Russians rejected a shipment of Iranian tobacco as "unsatisfactory."
In the face of the spreading Communist-led strikes and deteriorating Soviet-Iranian relations, the Majlis (parliament) will meet in Tehran tomorrow to approve the recent imposition of martial law in the strike area. The government national front, composed of leftists and extreme rightists, is violently opposed to approving the government action.

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
