Sister Mary's Kitchen

BY SISTER MARY

Breakfast—Baked rhubarb, cereal, thin cream, bread crumb pancakes, maple syrup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Bean stew, toasted crackers, shredded fresh pineapple, vanilla cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Breast of lamb, boiled rice, buttered parsnips, jellied vegetable salad, cream pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Little bits of left-over vegetables work up satisfactorily in a jellied vegetable salad. I like to fold a well seasoned salad dressing into the jelly just as it begins to thicken. This insures a "tasty" salad without any bare spots, as it were. Then a spoonful of real mayonnaise dropped on top of each serving forms an attractive garnish and adds to the richness of the salad.

Baked Rhubarb. Twelve prunes, 1 cup boiling water, 1 cup sugar, 3 cups rhubarb cut in inch lengths.

Wash prunes and let stand 1 hour in cold water to cover. Remove stones and cut fruit in small pieces. Wash and cut rhubarb. Put rhubarb, prunes and water into a covered baking dish and cook in a moderate oven about thirty minutes. Add sugar and cook about thirty minutes longer or
