Dear Dr. Larsen:

On September 30, radio station WJR in Detroit carried the attached statement on its 6 a.m. news program. As you will note this is based on an Associated Press story from Iowa City, Iowa, following an address you had made to science writers at the University of Iowa.

As you will see, the Associated Press news account strongly implies that lead poisoning among children which you discussed is related to motor vehicle exhaust. The reporter apparently was not aware nor would the reader be, as you surely are, that accidental lead poisonings among children are in no way related to auto exhausts or lead in the atmosphere.

You will agree, we're sure, that this misinterpretation by the press illustrates the danger of statements of this kind being taken out of context and creating erroneous impressions when given further circulation.

We urge that you, as a representative of the U.S. Public Health Service, make a clear distinction between auto exhaust emissions and accidental lead ingestion by children. From decades of medical and scientific investigations relative to lead with which we are familiar, we know of no data linking auto exhaust with lead poisoning in children or others.

" Associated Press -- (Iowa City, Iowa) -- An expert on air pollution says this country is running out of air. Dr. Ralph Larsen -- an official with the U. S. Public Health Service -- made the remark in an address to Science Writers at the University of Iowa.

According to Larsen, pollutants in the air hurt man, animals, plants and property. And he adds that most of the pollutants come from the exhausts of motor vehicles. He says the foreign matter they produce can cause dizzy spells, headaches, respiratory ailments, and the like.

The air pollution expert told the science writers that lead -- a so-called cumulative poison -- can lead to brain damage, especially among young children. As evidence, Dr. Larsen stated that lead poisoning has a fatality rate of 25 percent.

Larsen recommends one particular way to obtain what he calls quality air: that is to eliminate 90 percent of the sources of air pollution. But he cautions that the consumer must pay for the doing away of air pollution."
