The Veterans' Area Job Training Agency reported that \$194,999 in community reemployment funds to retrain women discharged from Defense Brass and that vacancies was sent to \$200,000 in the development of a budget proposal. The budget, presented at a hearing Thursday, will not be final until the afternoon of Oct. 10 next month.

The training agency's proposal cites layoff problems at Bristol-Babcock Inc. as "targeted for immediate service."

"Other identified workers will be serviced as they meet the definition of a dislocated worker," wrote job training officials in their reply.

"We have a crisis wherein there are layoffs at Century and Bristol-Babcock, but the funding received by your agency from the federal government is not for these plant members," John Grotusky said at the hearing.

The bumping process continues at Century for another month and then those who haven't found another job within the plant are left out in the cold.

Police Raid Nets Drugs, Guns, Cash

Police raided an Orange Street house Tuesday evening and confiscated 7 pounds of marijuana, two handguns, more than \$12,000 in cash and some white powder believed to be cocaine.

The resident — Rupert R. Johnson, 34, of 107 Orange St. — was charged with possession of marijuana with intent to sell, possession of narcotics and possession of drug paraphernalia. He was held in lieu of \$25,000 bond.

14. Thomas Brown, commander of the Vice and Intelligence Unit, led the raid. He characterized Johnson as "a major dealer."

Brown said police had the house under surveillance for a month. Seven detectives raided the place Thursday around 7:45 p.m. Johnson was home.

Police said they found two large bags containing marijuana, mostly split up into 1-pound bags, and cash hidden behind false walls.

Brown said the marijuana is sold for about \$500 a pound and had been

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
