Dear Mr. Endicott:

It is entirely proper to make the transfer of \$3000. from the Lead Fund to the Massachusetts General Hospital, this being money specifically given for the purpose of maintaining lead patients in the wards for study in this particular investigation. I therefore request that this transfer of \$3000. to the Massachusetts General Hospital be made.

I would also request the following: On November 20 Mr. Thompson instructed your office to apply \$300. from the Morgan fund to the Department of Bacteriology. I find now that that fund was really given in the beginning to Dr. Langdon Frothingham, and is still supposed to be at his service. I do not feel from what I now learn that we can properly employ it so long as Dr. Frothingham wishes to use it. He does so wish at present. I therefore request that the whole income of the Morgan fund be made available for Dr. Langdon Frothingham's use, and that the \$300. from this assigned to the Department of Bacteriology be covered from the general funds.

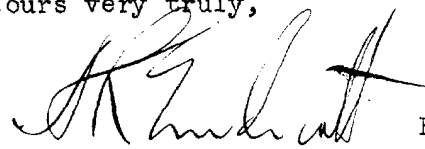
