Barry Kriger, co-anchor:

Cathie Lassi (Concerned Neighbor): We're concerned about our neighborhood. We've raised our children here. And we're very concerned about all the toxics that are buried under the ground floating around in the air. We breathe it every day.

Edward Jamro (Manager, Solutia): There are emissions and wastes here at the site. But the fact is is that we have reduced wastes and emissions by over seventy percent, over the last ten years. Personally, I've been here eleven years. And my promise and legacy for the Indian Orchard area, is to reduce pollution and emissions as much as possible.

Kriger: Solutia officials claim their Indian Orchard plant creates less and less hazardous waste materials.
