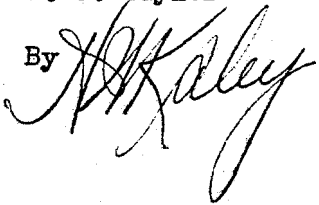
Dear Dr. Kehoe,

MEMO TO MR. J. C. TAYLOR

ATTENTION: MR. H. W. KALEY

Regarding the case of Mr. [REDACTED] of West Nyack, New York, reported by Mr. Hartmann of the Gulf Refining Company, Pittsburgh.

Our Mr. Donohue has contacted with Mr. Clark, the local manager at Ridgefield Park, New York, who advised that Mr. [REDACTED] was not seriously burned and that he did not think it was due to lead poisoning. Mr. Clark advised his office of this case mentioning the Ethyl Gasoline Corporation merely as a means of precaution.

Mr. Donohue talked with Mr. [REDACTED] and learned that the skin infection was caused two weeks ago and is now entirely healed. It seems Mr. [REDACTED] had been picking blackberries and after scratching his hands had spilled gasoline on them. He went to Doctor Pheis at Nyack, New York, who diagnosed the case as gasoline burn and did not claim that it was due to lead poisoning.

Mr. [REDACTED] does not believe this trouble was caused by lead poisoning but he merely questioned it as a cause at the time of the infection. He did not mention to anyone that he blamed it on Ethyl Gasoline.

Inasmuch as his hands are entirely healed now, I believe we may safely forget about this matter.
