Dear Dr. Schwartz:

We are happy to forward you information concerning Pydraul F-9.

This fluid is not particularly toxic from the standpoint of accidental ingestion. If such occurs, however, vomiting should be induced in the patient by the administration of warm saline solution, dry mustard in water, or by sticking the finger in the throat. The administration then of fluids such as water, milk, or tea is suggested as is the case with the swallowing of any non-food liquids.

If there is skin exposure, the skin should be washed with soap and water. If the fluid is hot enough to cause burns, it should be removed by soap and water and the area treated as it would be with any thermal burn.

If there is accidental splashing in the eyes, the eyes should be flushed with copious quantities of water for at least 15 minutes. If irritation and pain develops, the patient should be referred to a physician. Treatment by physicians has included the administration of ophthalmic solutions containing local anesthetics and ophthalmic cortisone eye drops to relieve the irritation.
