The membership subscription reflects an increase of 15 per cent to be used for the Special Health & Safety Public Relations Program approved by the Board of Directors. These figures will be adjusted at a later date when your 1965 tonnages for lead mined, smelted and refined, and consumed in manufacture are made available to us. Minimum subscriptions of \$200 for regular members and \$1,000 for foreign producers are also subject to the 15 per cent special subscription.

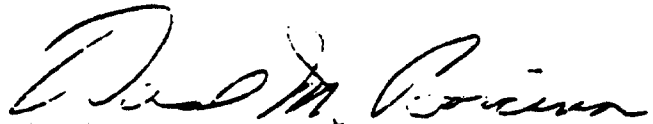
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SUBSEQUENT ADJUSTMENTS
