said:
"A U.S. technical observer has
stated his belief that the Russians
could incorporate several of the
newer features of the B-29 into
their opposite number, including
turbo-superchargers. (These are
used to boost the power of the en-
gines, producing more speed and
rate of climb.) However, he does
not think they can duplicate the
extensive remote fire control
equipment. (With this equipment,
a single gunner at the main con-
trol system can direct the fire of
12 .50 calibre machine guns on
attacking enemy fighters.)"

"He estimated that it took 20
months to build a production
model of the B-29, using the Rus-
sian-held models as a starting point
for design. After delivery of the
first production model it would
take 12 months to achieve the rate
of 150 a month. That would be
32 months after the first start, or
April 1947, assuming that this work
was commenced immediately after
July 29, 1944, when the first B-29
fell into Russian hands and that
Russian industrial capabilities were
equal to those of the United States
—a tenuous assumption."

The Air Force believes that,
using the B-29 as a basic pattern,
the Russians have built both a
bomber and a transport version
of the plane. This has appeared
as the Tupolev TU-70, now be-
lieved to be in production.

How long did it take Russian
pilots to learn how the big bombers
were flown?

"Although there is evidence to
support the contention that the
Russians had become almost inti-
mately familiar with the workings
of the B-29 just a year after the
first one had fallen into their
hands, there is nothing in the avail-
able records to indicate that they
were flying them at that time.

"An Allied military observer
noted a formation of 48 planes that
looked like the B-29 flying over
Moscow on October 23, 1947. He
said the fact that no B-29s were
flown in the May Day parade on
May 1, 1947, and that three partici-
pated in the August 3, 1947, air
show may be a clue to the produc-
tion pace of the USSR. The fact
that it took the Russians a year
over two years to get into produc-
tion is regarded as quite an
achievement."

A crewman of one of the B-29s
which the Russians seized in late
August, 1945, reported that a
Russian engineering officer visit-
ed his plane, flipped switches,
located shorted-out fuses and
otherwise indicated he was "com-
pletely familiar" with the Ameri-
can bomber's operations.

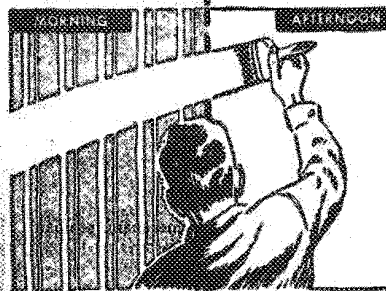
**Diving Board Involved
