Dear Dr. Kehoe:

In regard to case # OD 12907 of the Industrial
Commission of Ohio, [REDACTED]

On examination of this patient Jan. 23, 1936, at
Good Samaritan Hospital, he complained of dimness of vision,
difficulty in breathing, and some decrease in hearing.

On nasal examination, I found a badly deflected
septum, causing blockage of the ethmoid sinuses, with some
mucoid secretion in both nasal passages, coming from both
middle and superior meatae.

Patient's pharynx also mildly congested, with tonsil
tags also moderately infected at both bases.

Tympanic membrane of both ears seemed to be retracted,
and eustachian tubes only slightly patent, due to presence of mucus.

The eye examination at the time appeared to be normal from the fundus standpoint. However, on more detailed examination at our office, Dr. Urner has found some definite macular changes, with the usual visual loss, which I believe he has, or will report, under separate cover.

On summary I feel that Mr. [REDACTED] has a definite, subacute ethmoiditis, with chronic catarrhal Otitis and conduction deafness, as well as chronic, infected tonsillar tags.

Hoping this information may be of use to the State Commission, and if there is any other information which you desire, I will be glad to send it to you upon request.
