To all,
I currently live in Seminole County for almost 6 years. I also lived in Volusia County for 9 years. The two things common is the rise of the St Johns River // Lake Harney in both areas during Natural Disaster events.

We suspect that our love for the river will be diminished by new building developments around surrounding areas that connect to the river basin north and south. These natural events in the past and currently are uncontrollable -- the water comes faster and stays longer. It's a fact.
