KEY STATEMENTS FOR WCAU-TV INTERVIEW (8/88)

A group of world-renowned scientists met in London last September and concluded that for glass fibers the possible risk of lung cancer among the general public is very low, if there is any at all, and should not be cause for concern if the current low levels of exposure continue.

Last year, scientists from the International Agency for Research on Cancer, known as IARC, evaluated data from a substantial number of human scientific studies and concluded that evidence was inadequate to link fiber glass with cancer in man.

Data from more than 400 scientific reports and studies produced over the past 50 years supports the fiber glass industry's position that fiber glass is safe to manufacture and use.

The Thermal Insulation Manufacturers Association, commonly known as TIMA, has taken a proactive approach to ensuring that fiber glass is safe by sponsoring health studies, which are conducted by leading scientists at independent U.S. national laboratories and universities. Frankly, I don't know of any other industry that has studied its products as extensively as the fiber glass industry.

The fiber glass industry's commitment to health research is demonstrated by the fact that TIMA has an active Health Safety Group, which is responsible for initiating, evaluating, directing and administering all TIMA research activities relating to health, safety and work environment.

Questions and Answers in Preparation for WCAU-TV Interview

1. Are homes with fiber glass insulation safe?

Yes. This belief is backed by data from over 400 reports and studies over the past 50 years that show no cause and effect relationship between fiber glass and disease in man.

2. If fiber glass is safe, why do you recommend that workers wear respirators when installing fiber glass?

It is wise to avoid inhaling any foreign dusts or vapors, and so we suggest that those who work with fiber glass follow recommended work practices.

3. Why have manufacturers changed their product labels to indicate that fiber glass is possibly carcinogenic?

Manufacturers modified the labels on their insulation products to reflect a June 1987 classification by the International Agency for Research on Cancer, known as IARC, that is based largely on experiments in which tumors were produced by injecting or surgically implanting large doses of glass fibers into the lungs of laboratory animals -- studies that in no way resemble conditions in which humans would be exposed to fiber glass.

There is a lot of debate in the scientific community about that classification because when IARC scientists looked at data from a substantial number of human

studies they concluded that there was "inadequate evidence" to link fiber glass with cancer in animals, even if there is no such link in humans.

4. Is fiber glass another asbestos?

No. There are important differences between the two materials, most important of which is the fact that fiber glass has not been shown to cause cancer in man -- asbestos has.

Fiber glass and asbestos can be compared to sugar and cocaine. They look similar, but they have radically different effects on the body.

The materials are different in terms of chemical composition, physical structure and, most importantly, in the way they react in the body. Animal studies show that glass fibers, unlike asbestos, tend to dissolve in bodily fluids and can be naturally cleared from the body.

5. What does the industry have to say about the former Owens-Corning employee who is alleging health problems.

I'm not familiar with the case, but it's very possible that that particular worker may have been exposed to materials in other environments that could have caused health problems. Tens of thousands of fiber glass workers have been studied during the past fifty years, and the data has shown no cause and effect relationship between fiber glass and disease in man.

6. There is a trend in the fiber glass industry toward making finer glass diameter fibers, apparently because it has better insulating properties. Isn't that type of fiber glass more readily inhaled into the lungs and, therefore, more dangerous?

First of all, fibers must be airborne in order to be inhaled; and studies show that airborne exposure levels during production and installation generally are below recommended federal government levels. Even if some fibers did get into the lung, studies show that very fine glass fibers are the ones that dissolve most readily in bodily fluids.

In a study completed at the Los Alamos National Laboratory in 1986, rats and hamsters inhaled fine fibers -- up to 1,000 times the amount currently allowed in the workplace -- with no adverse health effects.

8. Richard Munson had launched a campaign against the fiber glass industry, forming a group called Victims of Fiber Glass and claiming that the material is a "death dust." How do you respond to his claims?

It's important to point out that Mr. Munson is involved in the cellulose insulation business, a competitor of fiber glass. His statements have to be considered in this context. It would be like evaluating Lee Iacocca's statements about Honda or another competing car manufacturer.

SUBJ: OSHA RULEMAKING HEARING AND NIOSH TESTIMONY

In updating its proposed rule on air contaminants, covering more than 400 substances, the U. S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) is conducting hearings in Washington, DC. OSHA proposes a standard of 5mg/m³ for fibrous glass dust and 10 mg/m³ for mineral wool fiber (gravimetric method).

On August 1, the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), research arm of the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services, commented on OSHA's proposed rule. Richard A. Lemen, Director of the Division of Standards Development and Technology Transfer, presented NIOSH's testimony. NIOSH's current Recommended Exposure Level (REL) for fibrous glass is 3f/cc (fiber count method). NIOSH does not now have a REL for mineral wool.

TIMA supports the efforts of OSHA and NIOSH aimed at protecting worker health as evidenced by its long-standing and extensive research program and by its continuation of that research. Further, TIMA believes all rulemaking should be based on sound scientific research and the association will continue to fully cooperate with governmental agencies to assist in the collection of all current medical-scientific information.

Attached is a copy of NIOSH's written testimony and a transcript of TIMA's cross examination on August 1.
