NO AGREEMENT

Not one member of the present council has an axe to grind."

Regarding the accusation that some decisions of the council had been reached in private sessions, Mayor Heron said "We realize that we have met in private sessions, and in these sessions it is difficult not to reach decisions. I agree that it would be admirable to meet publicly, hold discussions and arrive at decisions, but it is exceedingly difficult to discuss some things in the open."

NO MORE PRIVATE SESSIONS

He continued by saying that from now on he was not going to give "hours and hours and hours" to working out city problems. He hinted that the city might have to hire somebody to do some of this work, and suggested Peter Hawasley, who has done part-time work on city business in the past.

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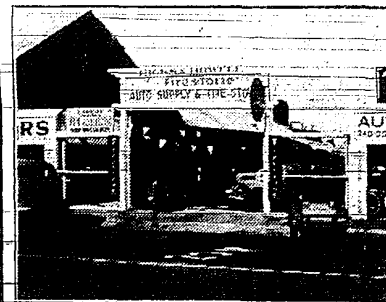
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Additionally, the firm sells used cars and has an automotive repair department.
