Dear Dr. Badal:

I send you herewith the analytical results on the blood and urine
of your patient, [REDACTED], referred to in your letter of
October 23.

As I anticipated from the information given in your letter, these
results are quite low, being clearly indicative of the fact that
this man had had no very significant lead exposure at the time of
the onset of his acute illness. My expectations were based on the
following points; (1) your history and clinical findings rather
strongly suggested that this man had not suffered any very severe
exposure; and (2) it is not to be anticipated that an acute illness
of the type described would result in any "mobilization" of "stored"
lead.

As you will recognize, this information does not assist you in
arriving at a diagnosis in this case, but in my opinion it does
exclude any factor of lead exposure in relation to this illness.

I enclose herewith a bill to cover the cost of the analyses, as
usual.
