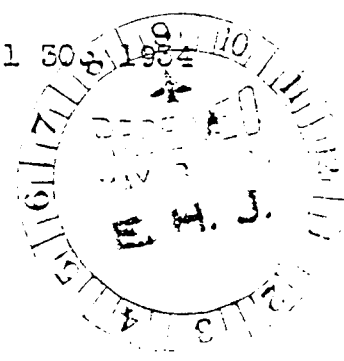

SUBJECT: X-ray and Physical
Examination

Replying to your letter of the 23th,
you may proceed to make arrangements with Dr.
Taft for the X-ray pictures and with Dr. Wild
for the physical examinations.

I think you would be a little bet-
ter off if you would start the physical examina-
tions and X-rays on the new applicants for work,
and then build up your morale among the employees
to the point where you can get them to come to
you and ask for the physical examination, in
place of going in and telling them you are going
to examine them all wholesale. This is the way
we intend to work it at Mannheim and Bridgeport.

The idea of the Metropolitan Insur-
ance Co. writing you the letter such as proposed,
is very good, and I think will assist a great
deal at Charleston.

When Dr. Lanza's men arrive, if they
want X-rays taken of certain men, I don't think
there would be any question about getting them
in a perfectly voluntary way.

Dear Judd:

I have for acknowledgement yours of the 9th instant under subject as above, enclosing copies of letters as mentioned, and thank you for keeping me posted as to what is being done along these lines.

There is one point I would call to your attention - that is, I note that in the last paragraph of the copy of your letter addressed to Mr. Vandiver Brown (same not being dated), that you request Mr. Brown to furnish you with certain information as to the X-ray machine which they have put in. You then go on to state that you are trying to make a decision as to whether this Company should put in one of these machines, or have the negatives and readings made by local talent.

In regard to this, would advise that Mr. Simpson wrote me under date of April 30th, instructing that I make arrangements with Dr. Taft, a local physician, to make these X-ray pictures for this Division.

I am calling this to your attention for if there is any misunderstanding it will be well to notify me at once so I can take the matter up further with Dr. Taft, whom I know has gone ahead and purchased the necessary equipment for handling this matter. You will please understand that by my remark in regard to purchasing the necessary equipment, I do not refer to the machines for taking these pictures, but the auxiliary equipment, such as plates, etc.
