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K. South, president of the South Palo Alto Improvement Club, will outline the educational and building needs of the South Palo Alto School; a similar report on the Stanford Elementary School will be submitted by Mrs. Howard Vollert, president of the campus parents' organization, and A. W. Manners will discuss the war production training program at the Peninsula Defense Training Center, of which he is supervisor.

A decision will be reached on whether or not to accept a federal allotment for child care centers and further study will be given the budget for 1944-45.

Among the personnel matters expected to come up will be the appointment of an American history and social problems teacher at the senior high school.

The meeting, which will be called to order at 7:30, will be open to the public.

Water proposal for coastside meets criticism

Opinions have clashed sharply over the report of Harry N. Jenks, consulting hydraulic engineer of Palo Alto, on a proposal to alleviate the water situation on the coastside of San Mateo county, since it was submitted to the board of supervisors. The study was made for the county engineer's office.

Bruce McIntyre, chairman of the Coastside Water Consumers' Association, called the report "ridiculous," alleging that it only confuses the issue in the north coast section. The estimated cost of \$151,000 exceeds the bonding limit, he said, and further contended that the plan does not provide for serving Vallejo, Edgemar, Rockaway Beach and Pedro Point. He asserted, too, that water would have to flow uphill if the plan were followed.

On the other hand, Chairman Fred E. Beer of the supervisors declared that the survey was made by outstanding engineering talent. "We believe this is a good report," he added.

Forecast is larger for winter wheat crop

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP) — The agriculture department yesterday forecast this year's winter wheat crop at 662,275,000 bushels.

A month ago the department's

methods of science and kept our mouths shut and pens dry until we knew more facts, then and only then could we speak with lasting judgment."

Those are the words of Dr. A. J. Carlson, whose belief it is that science can answer the "unknowables."

The 70-year-old scientist struck verbally at the "armchair philosophers" in his lecture at Stanford Tuesday night. He declared he had no argument with any of the ancient philosophers, but that the reflection was cast on their modern followers who still pretend that armchair logic is the answer.

"They did the best they could with what they had," he declared of the Greeks.

Of moderns, he asserted "An engineer knows you can't run a plant and you can't build an airplane on armchair logic."

Dr. Carlson, who earned his Ph.D. degree at Stanford 40 years ago, believes the claims of telepathy are a part of the field of science just as much as pain "because those are part of man — part of human experience."

There are three methods of investigating the nature of the universe and the nature of man, according to Dr. Carlson. These are philosophy, religion, and science. The last is his method — to which he was driven by philosophy, he said.

His method, Dr. Carlson believes, will make much progress in the next 100,000 years — meantime he will be glad to answer any questions.

Veterans' employment is problem for business

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11 (AP) — Employment of veterans is the big postwar problem which every business executive should "take to heart," declared Robert Gaylord, of Rockford, Ill., president of the National Association of Manufacturers, in an address to members of the Northern California Industrial Conference Tuesday night.

Gaylord belittled Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes' recent suggestion that war plants be given to veterans as a "bonus."

"What veteran wants 1-1000th part of a powder factory," said Gaylord, "or 1-2000th of an armor plant...?" He said some of the war plants should be "packed in grease" for possible future use, some put to peace time work and some written off as war casualties.

"If every employer of 10 people will take one veteran," said Gaylord, "the problem will be solved. It is a responsibility of management."
