Signs at Monticello Dam are hard to read behind chain link fence, do not need to be secure but should be readable from a vehicle on the parking area a few feet away. Logos are outdated and confusing. Signs at the dam are apparently made by contracting agencies without regard for facts or consistency with other signs such as at the visitor center. Posted information says Oak Shores day use area is “free” and there is no one to collect fees at the entrance kiosk, but halfway through the long narrow road an automated fee station says “pay here”, so the visitors are confused about what is required. The Capell Cove “free” public boat ramp is gated and closed without explanation, although it is the only public boat ramp available on the 23-mile-long lake besides a couple of expensive concessions. WiFi and cell phone service are not available to actually use the scans for this survey or visitor maps in the field or at the closed visitor center. The Cleve Dufur visitor center is named as a memorial for a deceased former lake concessions staff employee in violation of federal regulations, while the concession status remains highly controversial. Portable toilets outside of former flush toilets are very uncomfortable and embarrassing as obvious dysfunction of maintenance and management of important recreation facilities in many locations including concessions and direct-management day use areas. Markely Cove concession has flush toilets for staff only, while visitors are told to use outdoor portable toilets. Painted vault toilets are unsightly at Pope Creek parking lot. Signs touting removal of invasive species are overgrown with invasive species at Pope Creek parking lot. The sign at Monticello Dam to “Be a C.O.P.” Is confusing and inappropriate since there are actually no facilities or means nearby to “Observe Proper
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		Disposal Sites “ etc. and misuses a gas pump image for no apparent reason. The sign at Monticello Dam maps resorts that have been fully dismantled and closed for decades and mislead visitors to the far side of the lake many miles away. The entire east side of Lake Berryessa is fully ignored on maps and signs as important public access by road and boat or by hiking.

Signs have been placed in the park inviting bicyclists to come barreling through the the handicapped parking zone and they are not for warned with signage that they are entering a disabled zone. It is not safe to open my passenger door there. I've had near collision experiences with bicyclist and am unable to safely use this space. The walkway entering the space from the bridge should be painted blue and signage needs to be placed directing the public to use the crosswalk provided instead of tramping through the disability zone. -There are misinformative signs placed along the national trail where the public is to have access to the pier. A real estate fraud was conducted in this area around 40 years ago. Signs are placed telling tourists that there is no outlet in this direction which is not true. The trail exit cannot be used by persons with bicycles and strollers but there is pedestrian access in this direction. There are signs over in TC's Commons Beach area telling people about the trail (which is blocked by a house, swimming pool and tennis court) and that they have pier access (the pier is always locked though) the public is not informed that they also have access to the pool and tennis courts as a result of this real estate fraud.
