Dear Mr. Jellison:

In response to your letter of May 10, 1974, we have prepared a list of purchasers of blends containing vinyl chloride monomer from our Federal Hazardous location. We first sold these blends commercially in 1964. All our records only cover purchases since 1967.

Attached as Exhibit "A" is a tabular record of purchases to items 1 and 2 of your letter. The names and addresses of customers from 1967 to February 1974, with the name of individual contact, if known, and 11. our best estimate of minimum customer orders (order size) and 12. our best estimate of maximum customer orders (order size) are also included. Those customers with an asterisk purchased only small quantities or some time during the year five (5) years believed to be for the use of laboratory investigation. We regard this data as containing "business confidential" information and ask that you treat it as such.

Since we are not aware of what use our customers make of the products which we sell them, we cannot discuss the information requested by item 3 of your letter concerning which of our customers might employ products subject to the Federal Hazardous Substances Act.

In response to item 4 of your letter, our initial commercial sales of purulent blends containing vinyl chloride monomer were in 1964 and we discontinued selling such blends in February of 1974.

In response to item 5 of your letter, we have no information about our customers' current inventories or inventory turnover rates.

In response to item 6 of your letter, we have no information as to whether other uses, former or present, of vinyl chloride monomer in any other consumer products.

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1. *Chlorophyll a* (Chl a) is the primary photosynthetic pigment in most plants and algae. It is a green pigment that absorbs light energy in the blue and red regions of the visible spectrum.

2. *Chlorophyll b* (Chl b) is an accessory pigment that absorbs light energy in the blue and red regions of the visible spectrum. It transfers energy to Chl a for photosynthesis.

3. *Carotenoids* are accessory pigments that absorb light energy in the blue and green regions of the visible spectrum. They transfer energy to Chl a and Chl b for photosynthesis.

4. *Xanthophylls* are a type of carotenoid that absorb light energy in the blue and green regions of the visible spectrum. They transfer energy to Chl a and Chl b for photosynthesis.

5. *Phycobilins* are accessory pigments found in cyanobacteria and red algae. They absorb light energy in the blue and green regions of the visible spectrum and transfer energy to Chl a for photosynthesis.
