Olympic Five In Semi-Final A. A. U. Match

KANSAS CITY, March 14 (AP).—Like a lone warrior gone forth to battle in a distant land, the Olympic Club of San Francisco tonight will uphold the basketball prestige of the Far West against three Mid-Western fives in the semi-final round of the National A. A. U. basketball tournament.

Paired against Bethany College of Lindborg, Kan., the Olympics will battle at 8:15 o'clock. The second game at 9:15 o'clock will match the Henrys of Wichita, Kan., runners-up last year, and another college aggregation, East Central Teachers of Ada, Okla.

Henry's are repeaters. They were in the semi-finals a year ago, advancing into the finals at the expense of Ke-Nash-A of Keno, Wis., the team they eliminated last night in the second overtime game of the tournament, to qualify for the final four.

Bethany defeated the South Side Turners of Indianapolis, upstarters of the dope in beating out the favored Kansas City Strandbergs early in the week. Turners went to the semi-finals in 1929. East Central Teachers ousted the Murchison-Dit team from Omaha, a collection of freightmen University athletes. The Olympics won from the Kansas City Athletic Club, another touted entry composed mostly of players who this year competed on the University of Missouri team which won the Big Six conference basketball title.

Palo Alto ranked sixth in the United States which results at the end of four weeks were released, and local officers are awaiting the announcement of returns over the complete period.

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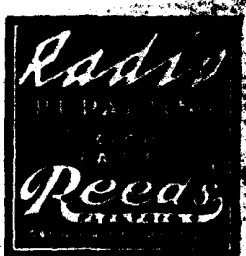
