Thanks very much for your several letters informing me of various developments. We have not yet received the magazine article mentioned in your letter of October 24, but I should be very much interested in seeing it when it arrives.

I shall write to Dr. Dove promptly, recognizing him as having replaced Dr. Hurtado in Colombia, and I shall try to keep in touch with him from now on.

I can recognize the problem presented by Dr. Cruz Coke's somewhat uncertain activities. With all due respect to his capabilities, he is somewhat inaccessible, and perhaps, slightly irresponsible. Nevertheless, I have no knowledge of how we could handle the matter better, and I agree with you that we should review the situation rather carefully before taking some other action.

I have received the copies of the placards which you sent me. They are quite adequate for my purposes, since all I attempt to do is to keep a complete file of material which is in official use. If any situation should arise whereby I should require additional copies, I shall let you know.

I was very glad to find that we were in such complete agreement with respect to the mixing plant at San Antonio, Chile. It sounded very much as though we had got together in advance, which is as it should be.

I hope things are coming along smoothly, and also that you are finding your work agreeable.
