In fact, our plant manager the reason I became plant manager was because he was promoted to general manager of the two plants, and we both supplied GAP and all the NAPA stores that were

asking me did I know anything about it, and I really didn't, I had never messed with one of those before, it was an arcing grinder, high speed grinder, and I'd say just in talking with people, as far as I remember, a guy by the name of John Franks who was in Indianapolis -- I'm sorry, Evansville, Indiana, at the time, he came down and they always introducing me to all these folks, old-timers, and they were always telling me about our relationship with the NAPA jobbers and American Brakebloc, who I call Abex, and just the way of conversation, I guess my teaching and training.

Q. So your teaching, training, and conversations with people employed or affiliated with NAPA is what you're basing your historical knowledge on?

A. When I was talking about the '30's, because my knowledge with NAPA started in 1966.

Q. Right. So, prior to -- what you know about it prior to 1966 comes from those --

A. That's correct.

Q. -- those sources I just mentioned?

A. Yes, that's right.

Q. Okay. So, going back historically before you started in 1966 all the way let's say through the 1970's to the end of the 1970's, was Abex or

supplied by GAP of remanufactured product, and the BHT plant went all the way back into the '30's.

Q. Okay. Do you know how far back the other I'll call them competitors, because that's how we termed it earlier, competitors supplied NAPA?

A. To my knowledge, and this is just talking to Walter Devoe, who is the plant manager there at Stephenville, and all the old -- when we was starting the new plant, we had a lot of old-timers come in, see the new facility, and they was always trying to teach me about NAPA because I really knew nothing about NAPA at the time, and this goes -- they go all the way back into I'm sure Genuine Parts and all of them all the way back in the '30's, also. Everything was Abex at that time.

Q. Let me ask you about that. You say everything was Abex?

A. Yes.

Q. Explain that to me.

A. Well, in all of our meetings, in fact, the day I went to work at Stephenville, the American Brakebloc representative was there, they were back there him and Walter trying to set up a production grinder to grind brake shoes, and this was a gentleman named Dale Schoonover, and they were

American Brakebloc a supplier of friction materials, brake friction materials, to NAPA?

A. Yes.

Q. Okay. Now, if a person went in a NAPA store to buy brakes and they bought brakes, they came in a NAPA box with a NAPA label on them, would those brakes during that period of time have been supplied or those friction parts in that box have been supplied by Abex or American Brakebloc?

A. This is from '60 through the '70's or further back?

Q. Let's go back to your historical knowledge, what you know, as far back as you know.

A. I'd say it goes all the way back somewhere in the '30's.

Q. Okay. And that would be the situation throughout the country including the parts your company supplied and your competitors supplied to NAPA?

A. Yes.

Q. Okay.

MR. GIANARIS: I think that's all I have for now.

MR. ABBOT: Let's take just a break for a second.

(BRIEF RECESS TAKEN.)

Q. (BY MR. GIANARIS) Sir, American Brakebloc and

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1 Abex, in your mind, are the same company? 2 A. Yes. 3 Q. You use them interchangeably? 4 A. Yes. 5 Q. Okay. And you -- let me read something to you 6 here. When I asked to take this deposition, I 7 asked for the person most knowledgeable regarding 8 the sale or supply of products manufactured by 9 American Brakebloc, also known as Abex, and/or its 10 successor to or through the NAPA distribution 11 centers generally on the national level. Do you 12 feel like, in your business organization, you would 13 be the person who fits that bill? 14 A. I wouldn't say national because I'm not familiar 15 with the west coast at all. 16 Q. Okay. But, other than the west coast, you feel 17 comfortable with that description? 18 A. Yes. 19 Q. Okay. 20 MR. GIANARIS: That's all I have. Thanks. 21 EXAMINATION 22 BY MR. ABBOT: 23 Q. Hello, Mr. Allen. My name is Ed Abbot. I 24 represent Pacumo-Abex Corporation. I have just a 25 couple questions.	1 over the BHT plant, and I became plant manager, and 2 he was flying back and forth running both plants. 3 We had people like John Hoving, for example, who 4 was a Houston distribution center manager. We were 5 talking to these people on a regular basis bringing 6 in customers trying to get the business, and this 7 would be all the people in Dallas, and I'm talking 8 about in jobbing stores, NAPA parts stores, 9 Houston, San Antonio. 10 Q. Okay. Let me just go back to the knowledge you 11 have prior to 1966 that's not based on your 12 personal knowledge? 13 A. Absolutely not. 14 Q. Could you do me -- you had mentioned NAPA jobbing 15 the past and distribution centers. 16 A. Right. 17 Q. Could you provide me with kind of your 18 understanding of what a NAPA distribution center 19 is, what a NAPA jobber is, and what the retail 20 store is, how that works, how that all works 21 together? 22 A. Let's start with the distribution center. Of 23 course, we used to call them warehouses back before 24 we went to distribution centers. These are people 25 that supply the NAPA parts stores for their

The distribution brings in product from a 5 lot of suppliers. They have -- they have engines, 6 belts, hoses, remanufactured parts, numerous 7 things, and they supply those exclusively to the 8 NAPA stores at that time. 9 The NAPA stores, which could be a company 10 owned or it could be an independent owned, they 11 stocked all of what they considered to be a stock 12 that they needed to supply their particular given 13 area and this went out to dealers, it could be 14 individual walk-in trade, companies, anyone that 15 they were going to be doing business with. 16 As far as the retail store, I don't think 17 I'm knowledgeable enough about the retail store to 18 talk about it. This is something that's fairly new 19 as far as the super stores. 20 Q. Okay. You've made a reference to NAPA stores. 21 that also the same as the terminology NAPA jobber? 22 A. Yes. 23 Q. Okay. Now, the NAPA jobbers they were not required 24 to purchase all of their materials from a NAPA 25 distribution center, is that correct?

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1 A. No, there was no contract that I know of.

2 Q. They were free to purchase brake linings from other
3 manufacturers other than Abex?

4 A. They could, but most of them didn't or any of the
5 remanufactured parts.

6 Q. Okay.

7 (OFF-THE-RECORD DISCUSSION.)

8 Q. Just a couple more questions. When an individual
9 walked into a retail store and purchased brakes,
10 they would not necessarily be purchasing Abex brake
11 lining, is that correct?

12 A. During what time frame?

13 Q. Let's take your historical understanding prior to
14 1966.

15 A. They would be purchasing Abex material.

16 Q. In any retail store?

17 A. Yes, my understanding, yes.

18 Q. And what about the NAPA jobbers?

19 A. That's who we're talking about, the NAPA jobbers.

20 Q. Okay, but they were free not to -- but the NAPA
21 jobbers you just said --

22 A. They were free to purchase water pumps or anything
23 else from somebody else if they so choose, but most
24 of them are all loyal. Abex was a long time
supplier, and they were a good supplier. We still

1 like, were selling products that did come from
2 areas outside of distribution centers?

3 A. Well, that was part of our business to go in and --
4 if someone was buying water pumps, for example,
5 we'd try to get their business and bring them into
6 our plants and show them how we produced the units
7 and, if they were not buying our water pumps,
8 hopefully we could get their business. This was an
9 ongoing deal. There was stores that would be not a
10 NAPA -- not a NAPA store that would be selling any
11 kind of product that we were trying to get their
12 business; but the NAPA stores that I was in and any
13 of these changes like water pump changes is always
14 American Brakebloc.

15 Q. Was there a time, in your opinion, that it was not
16 American Brakebloc, American Brakebloc was not the
17 only supplier of brake linings?

18 A. I would say late -- late '80's, maybe early '90's.

19 Q. And the basis of that knowledge is what?

20 A. Well, BFI became the primary supplier I believe the
21 year was 1989.

22 Q. Did Genuine Parts manufacture its own line of brake
23 linings?

24 A. They don't manufacture brake linings.

25 Q. Okay. Tell me about Rayloc brakes, did they

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1 on some water pumps. 2 Q. You mentioned distribution centers. What 3 distribution -- what locations do you remember 4 these distribution centers; do you remember where 5 they were located throughout the country? 6 A. For GAP? 7 Q. Well, the NAPA, you mentioned NAPA distribution 8 centers or the distribution centers that had the 9 products. 10 MR. RILEY: Over what time frame? 11 Q. (BY MR. ABBOT) Let's go from 1966 when you started 12 to 1980. 13 A. All right, GAP supplied approximately 14 to 17. 14 Q. 14 to 17 distribution centers? 15 A. Yes. 16 Q. Who owned those distribution centers? 17 A. Part of them were owned by Genuine Automotive Parts 18 and some of were owned by I think the Boltens owned 19 Des Moines and Dewitt. I guess the rest of them 20 were GAP. Only those two were probably Bolton. 21 Q. Could you, just based on your recollection, today 22 let me know, identify for me, where those 23 distribution centers were located? 24 A. Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Kansas City, St. 25 Louis, Mount Vernon, Milwaukee, Stevens Point,	1 Industries, were you involved in the purchasing at 2 all? 3 A. Purchasing? 4 Q. Yes. 5 A. No, not at that time. 6 Q. And what year did you get involved with the 7 purchasing of product? 8 A. Somewhere around '69, maybe '68, '69, some 9 purchasing. 10 Q. Okay. What sort of purchasing were you involved 11 then? 12 A. Once the plant manager took over as general manager 13 of the two plants, I would help out sometime if we 14 were -- say someone was off on vacation or out sick 15 or something, I would help out on purchasing. I 16 talked with some of the people, I ordered some 17 brake lining. 18 Q. You ordered all different type of products, isn't 19 that correct? 20 A. Ordered American Brakebloc. 21 Q.
