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1930 and the national organization. Primarily they will be using Buddy Poppies that have been fashioned by the hands of disabled veterans in government hospitals throughout the country—men who are thereby afforded a source of income for personal necessities not provided by the government; itself.

In addition, the V.F.W. Buddy Poppy fund will be used for welfare activities among men in active military service.

Through the sale of the poppies, service officer and welfare committee of the local V.F.W. post are enabled to give aid and relief to veterans or service men in distress; those whose disabilities have destroyed their source of livelihood; to the dependent families of disabled veterans or to the widows and orphans of veterans or service men. Another percentage of the proceeds of the V.F.W. Buddy Poppy distribution makes it possible to maintain service-end- tison work at the various Veter- en's Administration regional offices and in Washington, D.C. Still another beneficiary of the Buddy Poppy fund is the V.F.W. National Home for Orphans of war veter- ans, at Eaton Rapids, Michigan.
