SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT

Gentlemen:

On October 22, 1953, a visit was made to the Fisher Body Division, General Motors Corp., E. 140th St. and Coit Rd., Cleveland, Ohio, to check further on the above numbered claim.

The company manufactures automobile bodies.

Investigation on this claim has been made by the investigator and it has been referred to this Division. The claimant alleged that during his spare time from October 26, 1942, to August 17, 1945, he would sweep around the sand blast. There was no one in the plant who could confirm or deny this statement. He may have, on occasion, done this work. Sand was used as the eroding medium in the sand blast. According to Mr. Stever, the sand blast equipment was the best obtainable and the dust that escaped would be at a minimum. One piece was put in at a time and sand blasted and removed. Employees stood on the outside and inserted their hands into gauntlets which were part of the curtain for operating the sand blast hose.
