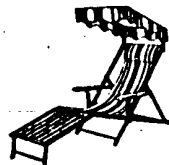
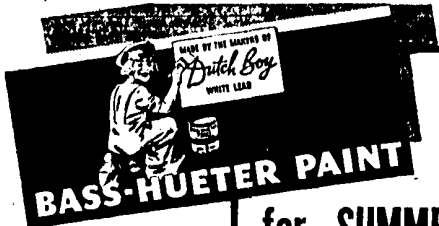

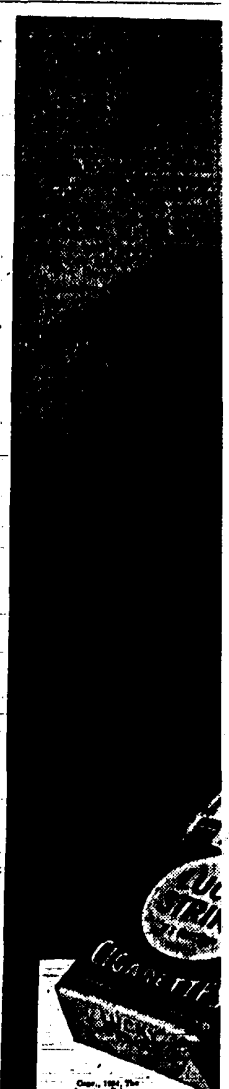

Seven of the 12 St. Louis packing plants affected by a strike of butchers and meat-cutters agreed to guarantee employees a 32-hour week and also to restore the strikers to their jobs if they make application within a "reasonable" time.
At Toledo Judge Roy R. Stuart was bonded and seized by women in a crowd which jammed his courtroom in protest against the arrest of 46 persons in connection with picketing disorders at the Electric Auto-Lite plant. Judge Stuart ordered the 46 prisoners released pending a hearing tomorrow.
A six-week strike of 1400 employees of the Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Company at East Hartford, Conn., was ended by a tentative
