Dear Stan:

Thanks very much for your letter of November 19th. I should have known, of course, that you had access to the original data, although at second hand, so to speak. However, no harm has been done, I hope, by my letter of inquiry, and I feel much better satisfied by your informative letter.

It will surprise you, I suspect, to know that I have found a fairly elaborate paper of mine which I had forgotten completely, and which covered fairly well the more significant findings in the first two thirds of our experimental work on normal subjects to whom lead had been administered via the oral and respiratory routes.

I can use the paper in preparing a more comprehensive paper for publication after the data have been published. Just how this will be done I am by no means certain, but I think (or hope) I shall be able to do this to my satisfaction. I shall have to get rid of my visual disabilities (the cataracts) to a much greater extent than I have thus far, and I hope to do this fairly soon now, for I cannot discern any progression on the part of the retinal degenerative lesions lately. Incidentally, I should tell you that the paper I write will be concerned somewhat, of course, with the data but what I hope to do is to deal, primarily, with physiological principles and facts, so as to make as much as possible of those phases of the work. I think that you, Sobel, and Ter Haar will appreciate more fully what I mean in this matter when and if I find it possible to accomplish what I have in mind.

Again let me thank you for your prompt response to my inquiry. Best regards to yourself and Mrs. Gross.
