Thanks for your detailed letter on your wishes and plans for both Doctor Boyd and Doctor Barry. I think your ideas are entirely realistic, and we shall fit into them satisfactorily. We shall be glad to have Doctor Boyd at the time you have planned for him to be here. I have found accommodations for him at the Vernon Manor Hotel. Your plans for having the work carried on in his absence seems to me to be excellent. No doubt Doctor Barry will have some difficulty, and your medical service will be a bit thin in spots, but it should work out fairly well. We shall do our best for Doctor Boyd.

We shall also look forward to having Doctor Barry under much the same conditions next year, if things work out as you anticipate.

I do hope that circumstances will allow you to come out to see us when you come over in October. If it is not possible, I shall be able in all likelihood to see you in New York.

Katy is thinking of some further training, and in psychology, with the likelihood that she will seek some of it in England, perhaps in London. I don't know what she will finally decide to do, but her plans involve remaining abroad for some time if not indefinitely.
