Dear Dr. Hillenbrand:

I am sending you herewith a report on the results obtained on your patient, [REDACTED]. You will note that these results are entirely in agreement with each other, and that they are somewhat higher than those usually found on workers in your plant. They are not unlike results found in other workers in lead plants, in that they show some evidence of lead absorption. In this instance the results are fairly near the threshold of intoxication, but they are not dangerously high, and unless this man had typical symptoms and other physical signs, they would not be regarded as necessarily suggestive of lead poisoning. From what you have told me about the case I think it is fair to conclude that the man does not have lead poisoning.

Thanks very much for the further information and comments in your letter. I am sorry you are leaving Harrison Radiator, but I am glad you found it useful experience and I am even more glad that you know what you want and are going out to get it. Please accept my very best wishes for the further success of your work. I hope we shall have occasion to meet many times.
