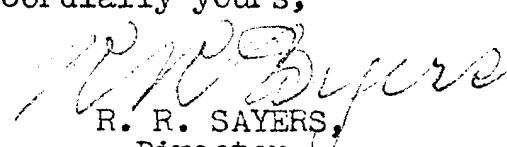
Dear Doctor Kehoe:
