The county has filed suit for \$1,976.98 in taxes and penalties for the fiscal years 1960-61 and 1961-62 against the Catermat Corp. of America, a Los Angeles firm that operates vending machines on the base.

The county contends it has authority to tax personal property on that portion of the base acquired during World War II, since the federal government did not retain exclusive jurisdiction there.

Catermat contends the county has no more authority to tax property in that area than it does in the original area acquired in 1917.

The disputed area takes in all that portion of the huge base along Highway 1 except some 200 acres in the northwest section.

At present the county is sending 53 other tax bills to owners of property in this area, and Assessor Donald Stewart conceded "it is pos-

Refunds would be "relatively small," however, Stewart said, because the property involved is not large and refunds could be obtained only for three years back.

Stewart pointed out the builders of the Wherry houses paid \$85,000 a year for several years prior to 1957 on property in the area challenged by Catermat.
