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DUST CONTROL IN THE CERAMIC INDUSTRIES*

This subject will never be more timely than at the present period of unprecedented plant expansion and plant improvement. When plans of this nature are under consideration, dust control aspects should also be considered. Will the new equipment be more or less dusty than the process it will replace? What plans should be made to eliminate dust?

I. Dust Control in Relation to Modernization Plans

The cost of dust control causes many a plant manager to hesitate when he is fundamentally dissatisfied with the offending process itself from the production standpoint. He is concerned with the expense of a dust control system that may be obsolete when the process itself is eliminated.

In any progressive company modernization is a continual process, and if needed dust control were to be postponed wherever there is thought of changing the equipment it would wait forever.

The three possible courses of action in these circumstances are (1) postpone the dust control expenditure until the new process has been installed, (2) install a first-class system which would be discarded when the process change developed, and (3) install makeshift dust control.

If it appears that none of these policies fit a given situation and, particularly, if the costs would really be excessive for the time period before reconstruction, it is well to re-examine the particular plans for dust control to see if they are not unduly elaborate for the circumstances.

II. Raw Materials Handling

Car unloading, storage, removal from storage to weighing and mixing equipment are operations that are common to all ceramic industries and these operations are inherently dusty. They are taken up in order.

(1) Car Unloading, Manual

The commonest method of shipment of clays, flint, and spar is by bulk in box cars with unloading commonly done manually by wheelbarrow.

By modern industrial standards this is a crude method of handling, but it is easily understood on the basis of relative costs of raw materials and of product. A cost of 40 to 50 cents per ton to unload a raw material by hand is an extremely small proportion of the selling price of about \$300 to \$400 per ton, using figures of the dinnerware industry. Economic incentives, therefore, for installation of silo storage and mechanical handling have not been great for the small plant, i.e., one handling small tonnages.

From the same facts it follows that the cost of the product could not be greatly affected by an ordinary increase in handling costs in this department. Nevertheless, we think it is fairly obvious that manual handling methods will continue to be common for a long time.

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Looking at the problem, for the moment, from the standpoint of the small plant operator who believes that he cannot justify the capital expenditure for mechanical conveyor unloaders and silo storage bins, what practical, efficacious methods are available?

In considering this question it is necessary to recognize that the minimum requirement for success is that the dust that may cause silicosis be completely controlled. This means that if the dust from pulverized silica and from silica sand can be completely suppressed, the minimum requirements are satisfied.

(2) Flint Dust Control

There is no way of eliminating the silicosis hazard in manual unloading of box cars of flint by exhaust ventilation.

If there were a procedure whereby such hazardous dusty materials could be made dustless by incorporating an addition agent at the point of shipment it would be advantageous. Water is such an agent and it has, in fact, been the practice in some sections of the dinnerware pottery industry for more than 10 years to require the supplier to incorporate small quantities of water in flint at the point of shipment.

Some extensive measurements have indicated that when properly done the effects of 2 to 3% moisture in dust suppression are literally marvelous. This procedure is capable of completely suppressing flint dust to concentrations below the hazardous level—as applied to the manual car unloading operation.

The procedure is of much broader importance than for this particular material. It will be useful in suppressing the dust in similar handling of feldspar and of such materials as silica cement for use in refractory furnace construction.

(3) Bag Shipment

It might be thought that shipment of flint in paper bags would be of great advantage in eliminating dust in car unloading, but in most instances this is not true. Sifting of material from bag openings and breakage of bags in transit distribute dry dust throughout the pile and this results in excessive concentrations of flint dust during car unloading. For ordinary handling methods, therefore, bag shipment of flint is no solution to the problem of preventing serious silica dust exposure in raw material handling.

In summary, we know of no practical method for adequate control of flint dust in manual unloading methods, those that require a man to go into the car, other than by rendering the material dustless.

Any arrangements that lessen or eliminate the time spent in the car are, of course, aids in reduction of total dust exposure. These include bin conveyors where wheelbarrow travel ends at the car door and a drag line scoop which scrapes material from the car interior to a conveyor, some requiring an inside scoop operator and others only an outside operator. The miniature power shovel development is in a similar general category but, obviously, with many superior features.

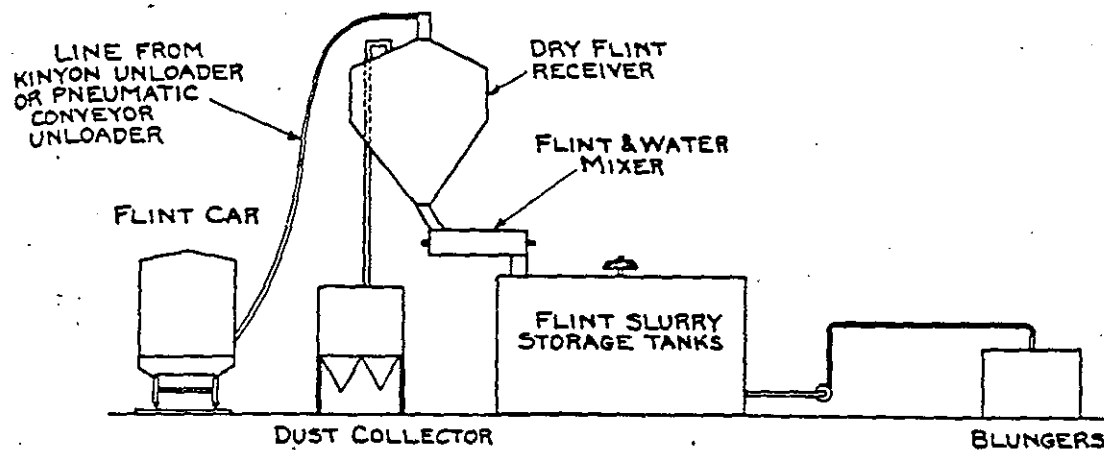


FIG. 1.—Dry flint unloading by pump and storage in form of slurry.

III. Overhead Bins, Silos, Etc.

Overhead storage bins mean mechanical conveying equipment. Some of the methods of car unloading previously outlined are often used in conjunction with overhead bins, but any modern installation of storage bins would employ, for silica or other free flowing dust material, a car unloading procedure that would prevent formation or escape of any dust. The material may be shipped in hopper bottom cars which discharge into equipment that conveys it to the bins, or it may be unloaded from box cars by a pneumatic pipe line or by pump.

Use of these arrangements eliminate the silicosis hazard in car unloading of flint and sand as well as any other free flowing material that may contain free silica. Dust from the clays that cannot be so handled is unchanged, but this is not related to the problem of silicosis control. Dust formed in removal from the storage bin must be taken care of by separate measures.

In glass plants, distributing belts in shuttle arrangement or with trippers, above open-top bins, are not uncommon. Belt conveyors are favored because they are best adapted to resist the abrasive action of ceramic raw materials but they do not simplify the problem of dust control. They are definitely not the conveyor of choice for fine dusty materials like soda ash, spar, etc. For other materials dust is readily controlled by installation of exhaust at points of transfer from elevator to belt or from belt to bin. Covered and exhausted sand bins are a primary necessity.

IV. Weighing and Charging

Dust caused by withdrawal of material from overhead bins into a weigh car may be controlled by exhaust at the point of discharge; its physical form will be determined by available space and the arrangements of bin spouts, weigh car, etc.

It may be done by a booth-type hood fixed over the weigh car and surrounding the chute, by exhausting the partially enclosed weigh car directly, or even by exhausting the charging tunnel as though it were a large booth.

Scale cars in some cases may be exhausted by a small fan and dust collector mounted on the carrying frame.

(1) Morris System

The Morris patent describes an ingenious arrangement for exhausting the weigh car of a whiteware plant regardless of its position on the tracks. Since nearly all of the dust in shoveling material from one point to another occurs at the receiving pile (in this case the weigh car), it is apparent that it provides an effective measure for dust control at that point, and this applies to the clays that are shoveled. In the case of flint and feldspar, all dust is controlled because the weigh car is filled from storage silos by screw feeders and dust originates only at the point of screw discharge.

(2) Exhausting Charging Point

Exhausting the point where weigh material is discharged is not a difficult problem, using conventional design procedures, whether it be dropped by gravity into an elevator boot, or shoveled into a blunger or into a skip hoist.

(3) Wet Methods

Anyone who has watched the back-breaking, laborious and primitive methods of charging a mixer or blunger in a pottery plant is given to the thought, "There must be a better way of doing this."

The problem of weighing a continuous stream of dry materials accurately has not been solved in any simple and foolproof way. On the other hand liquids are easily measured accurately. This suggests, for certain ceramic industries, incorporating the dry raw materials with water during unloading of the car and storing them as water suspensions. Proportioning the raw materials without dust and accurately is, then, a simple procedure of liquid metering based on the solids content.

Methods of this general nature should be particularly applicable to whiteware manufacturers in which the raw material mixing process ends up with considerable excess water anyway. This principle is employed in wet process cement plants, in English potteries, and recently in a far western sanitaryware plant (see Fig. 1).

(4) Periodic Kilns

In the setting and drawing of periodic kilns, dust con-

centrations usually do not exceed 5 to 10 million, less in setting than in drawing. Rarely, concentrations may attain 15 to 20 million in brick kilns. This dust exposure, therefore, where dust contains little or no free silica, is unimportant. It may be important, however, in the case of silica brick.

The only control method applicable to control of this dust is exhausting air from the kiln interior (by means of a portable unit) at a very high rate. Success in reduction of dust will depend upon the dustiness of the particular operation, i.e., whether the rate of dust production is small enough to be effectively diluted by practically attainable ventilation.

(5) Product Is Dust

Perhaps the most significant characteristic of the ceramic dust control problem is that the dust is a part of the product, or the product itself is dust, and not an incidental material as in some other dusty industries. Where exhaust systems are employed for dust control in the raw material handling, every effort should, therefore, be made to reduce unnecessary transportation of useful material to

the dust collector. Cloth type dust collectors are sometimes so overloaded, unnecessarily, as to vitiate the effectiveness of the entire exhaust system. If various dusty materials are served by the same exhaust system, the dust is an unknown mixture and hence waste.

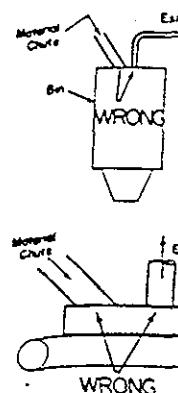


FIG. 2.—Needless

An important rule is to arrange the exhaust intake so that the only material removed in the air stream is that already suspended in the air and locate the ends of exhaust ducts connected to enclosures at remote points. This point is illustrated in Fig. 2.

The exhaust system is the most important element in the engineering of dust control and adequate design is imperative. Nothing is more discouraging than the expenditure of large sums of money for a system which does not do a good job or which requires constant attention for cleaning out.

On the other hand, an equally distressing design is one that is unduly extravagant and which consequently costs too much, exhausting twice as much air as required, and having also, perhaps, a dust collector of double the necessary size.

V. Nuisance Dust and Silicosis Dust

From time to time in the preceding discussion the writer has referred to silicosis hazards and to excessive dust. This is an important distinction. Silicosis is a pathological condition that may lead to disability and results from years of exposure to certain concentrations of dust that contain free silica. Excessive concentrations of other dusts constitute a nuisance, are intolerable and not excusable on any economic grounds. It is imperative to clear thinking that this distinction be made, because while it is agreed that both types of dust exposures must be eliminated, the two are separate problems and have altogether different degrees of urgency.

If there is a silicosis hazard there can be no question of economics or of economic balances; the hazard must be eliminated with the least possible delay.

If there is not a silicosis hazard but dust is still present in such concentrations as to constitute definitely disagreeable working conditions, plans for its control should also be instituted, but studies planned for maximum economy (and possibly stepwise installation of dust control equipment) may proceed with more deliberation.

(1) What Is Excessive Dust?

Definitions of excessive nuisance dust concentrations (the dust being inert) vary throughout industry generally pretty much proportionally to the difficulty of dust control. Continuous exposures in excess of 50 to 100 million cannot be considered acceptable anywhere. In ceramic plants, arbitrary limits varying from 25 to 50 million have been set by some plant operators for plant cleanliness, and in at least one plant the management has set for themselves a limit of 10 million.

VI. Measuring the Silicosis Hazard

Nuisance dust exposure is readily measured by conventional dust counting methods. These techniques determine total dust. Measuring the silicosis hazard on the other hand requires supplementary techniques to determine how much free silica is in that dust. (The most reliable determinations of free silica are made by X-ray

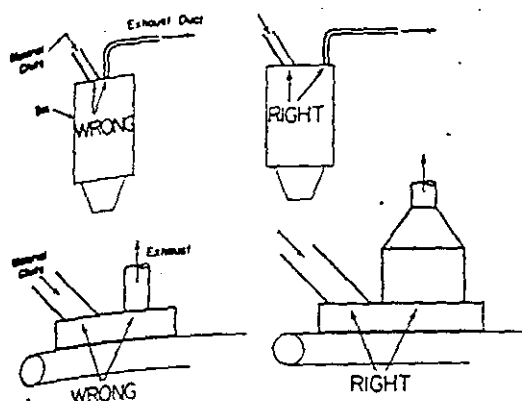


FIG. 2.—Needless product removal by exhaust system.

Furthermore, the sampling procedure is critical since only dust whose particles are smaller than a few microns in diameter are significant. If the sample contains particles of larger size it is an unrepresentative sample from the standpoint of the human lung and may give misleading results.

To ensure that the welfare of the employees is being cared for, enlightened management will take steps to obtain information as to the nature of present dust exposures and arrange for periodic X-ray and medical examination of workers.

VII. Nature Silicosis Dust Problem

Table III attempts to represent the over-all relative hazard from dust in raw material handling in four of the common ceramic industries. This table emphasizes that the hazard in a given case is the product of two factors: (1) the inherent toxicity which is governed by the free silica content of the material, and (2) by its inherent dustiness.

The silicosis hazard in raw material handling in glass plants is variable. In sand car unloading it is dependent on whether the methods employed make dust. In the batching operations it is nearly always very low, but the total dust exposure (nonsiliceous) is high where engineering measures for its control have not been instituted.

In silica brick manufacture all dust factors respecting silicosis are high. In refractories manufacture the silicosis hazard is usually very low or nonexistent, but total dust exposure may be very high. In potteries the silicosis hazard is a direct function of the amount of flint dust.

In factories where, by reason of the silicosis hazard, the objective of dust control is to reduce concentrations of dust to below 5 or 10 million, and where there are numerous

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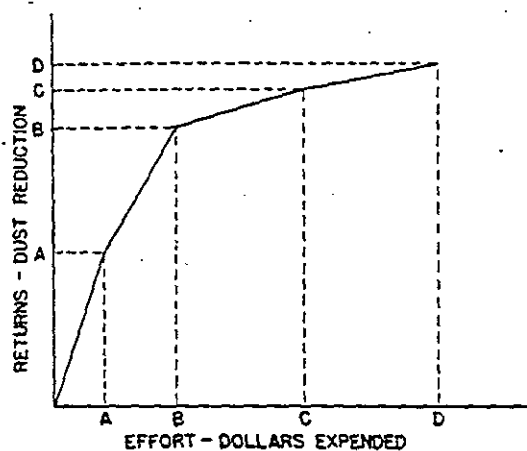


FIG. 3.—Diminishing returns in dust control.

sources of dust, a state of diminishing returns is commonly evident. Stepwise accomplishments measured in reduced dustiness cost more for each successive reduction in dust. (See Fig. 3.)

This is just another way of saying that money expended for control of major dust sources accomplishes more in dust reduction than the same amount expended in the next step for control of lesser sources. The arrival of stage A or B, where residual dust remains in undesirable amounts, often inspires the remark to visitors, "You should have seen it when—"

The first steps are concerned with control of obvious sources of dust. Beyond that point, the problem often becomes obscure. Important remaining causes of dust may not be obvious and their relative importance may not be clear. At this stage it is highly advantageous to an intelligent procedure to have definite knowledge of the remaining sources of dust and the relative amounts each contributes to the atmosphere.

For example, studies in the ceramic industries indicate that the debris on floors (dust kicked into the air by walking) contributes a very small proportion of dust where total dust concentrations are higher than 4 to 5 million. This data enabled concentration of attention on other dust sources of more importance. If the economic situation at this stage is difficult, relative to estimated costs of further improvement, arrangements should be made for measurements of total dust and its composition relative to free silica and consequent capacity to produce silicosis.

If the writer appears to stress unduly the factor of costs in relation to dust control it is hoped that the distinction made between the two aspects of the problem will make clear the attempt to have them viewed in proper perspective, i.e., as separate problems. The writer is convinced that any remaining silicosis hazards in this industry could be eliminated within a couple of years if management were apprised of the facts. The silicosis hazard can be measured and methods for its elimination, practically, are available.

Any ceramic plant with a dust hazard can eliminate it. All that is required is for the executive head to realize fully its importance to his company, to issue the orders that dust must go, and to maintain that interest throughout the cleanup program.
