

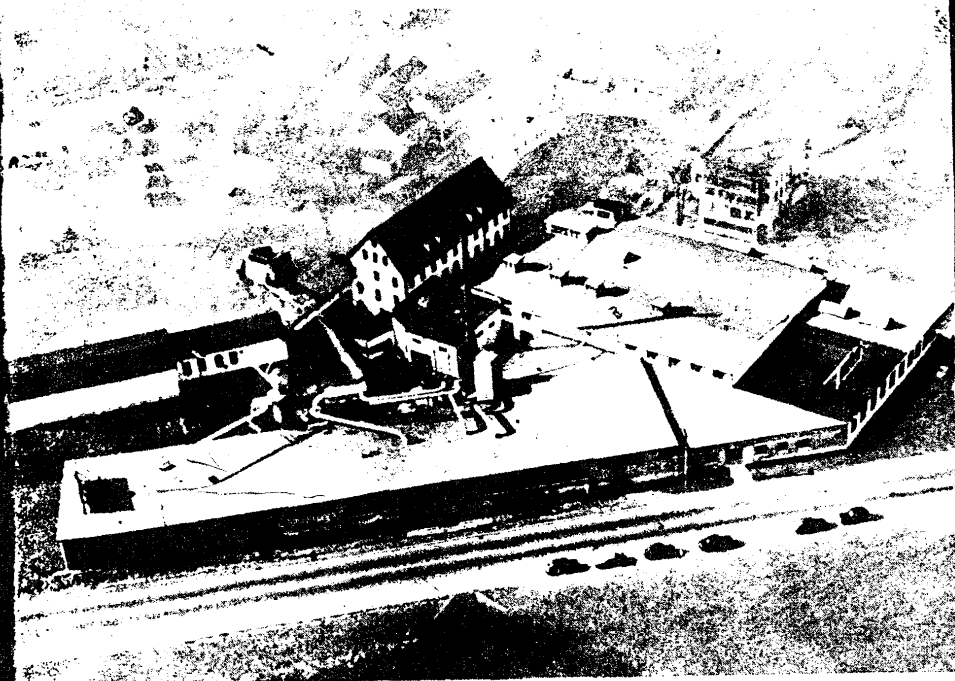

GROWTH IN THE CANADIAN ASBESTOS INDUSTRY

Asbestos producers, whose sales volume has more than doubled in the last decade, are predicting another big year in this important branch of the Canadian mining industry.

World markets are still absorbing the medium and long fibres as fast as they can be produced. Demand for the short grades picked up smartly during the last part of 1952 and is continuing to run ahead of the level a year ago.

As a result, the industry is expected to operate at near capacity levels during 1953. With new producers on the scene this, coupled with an expected increase in output from existing mines, should boost production above 1952.

Last year shipments of asbestos from Canadian mines totaled 928,487 tons, down 4% from 1951's record of 971,640. Thanks to price boosts in February and increased output of the higher-priced grades of fibre, however, value of the industry's production climbed to an estimated \$94 millions from \$81.5 millions the previous year.

The drop in production was due entirely to lower demand for "shorts", which lie at the bottom end of the asbestos value scale. Markets for these grades have expanded enormously in recent years—biggest is the asphalt floor tile industry—but demand was lower, and fluctuated widely, for most of 1952.

Late in the year the "shorts" market strengthened and producers are optimistic on prospects for 1953. By December over-all shipments of asbestos were running only very slightly behind the level of a year earlier (65,649 tons vs. 66,118 tons).

Asbestos prices have been steady since the February 1952, increase. They range downward from as high as \$1,300 a ton for the longest grades to \$27 for the shortest.

Export markets, of course, absorb almost all of Canada's asbestos production—last year 97.2%—and demand depends on general world business conditions plus, to some extent, exchange restrictions.

Canadian producers have been supplying about 63% of world demand, which has been climbing sharply in

Confident that the signs point to still larger markets in years to come, producers are expanding their facilities substantially.

Asbestos Corporation Ltd.

Asbestos Corporation Limited has work well under way at its new Normadie Mine, scheduled to come into production sometime next year. Lying adjacent to the company's Vinny Ridge Mine, ore reserves on this property are estimated at 19,750,000 tons and a big 5,000 ton daily capacity mill is being built to process them.

Before winter set in Asbestos Corporation had preparation of the plant site well advanced and the concrete tunnel for the rock storage bin completed. Roads were built while preliminary grading and clearing for a railway spur line was finished.

Cost of bringing the Normandie Mine into production was estimated originally at \$8 millions, with another \$1,750,000 needed to prepare for underground mining (it will be an open-pit operation for the first seven or eight years). This has since been raised considerably, however, to incorporate more advanced milling methods which have been developed. These will result in extracting a bigger percentage of asbestos from the ore and upgrading the production, and the cost increase is expected to be more than offset by higher profits.

Canadian Johns-Manville

Swinging southeast to Asbestos, Quebec, finds Canadian Johns-Manville hard at work on its big \$21 million program. This includes a new mill to replace exist-

ing facilities at its huge Jeffrey Mine, the biggest operating asbestos mine in the world.

Cassiar Asbestos Corporation Ltd.

During the past winter a bulk sample of some 3,679 tons of asbestos talus material was dried and screened to produce some 334 tons of Crude, 3K and 4K fibre. This has been subjected to full-scale production tests, with most satisfactory results. The magnetite content of the yarn was well within the specifications for non-ferrous grade asbestos products.

The 250-ton talus mill will be completed by July 1, 1953, when steady production is scheduled to commence. The output for the year July 1, 1953 to July 1, 1954 has been estimated as follows:

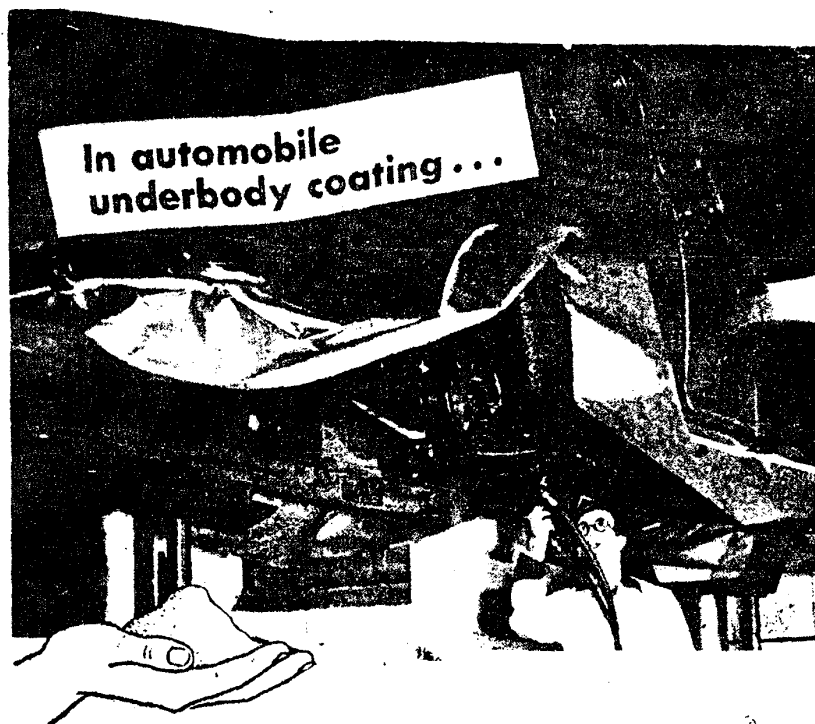
Crude No. 1 and No. 2	100 tons
3K Fibre	3,780—5,600 tons
4K Fibre	2,700—4,000 tons

Orders have been placed and construction is scheduled to begin immediately on the expansion of the plant to handle 500 tons per day by September 1, 1954. This includes additions to the mill building and equipment, a new dryer building to house two rotary dryers, a 40,000 ton dry rock storage building, a fibre storage building and the necessary additions to the power plant and shops.

The asbestos talus material will be moved down the hill in a steel chute to loading bins, where it will be loaded in 7-ton dump trucks and moved to the mill or stockpile. A survey will be made for a tramline, which will be erected during 1954 and which will have an ultimate capacity of 100 tons per hour.

New bunkhouses, staff dwellings, a recreation hall and school, laundry and staff houses are already under construction in the townsite.

Fibre will be trucked to Whitehorse in the company's own truck fleet which will be in operation this spring. A new 160-ft. Bailey Bridge is under construction on the Blue River, between the Alaska Highway and the mine and it is anticipated that work on the road should be under way by May 1st. The British Columbia Government has allotted funds to put this road in a condition suitable for semi-trailer operation.

The company has recently concluded arrangements with the Bell Asbestos Mines Ltd., at Thetford Mines, Quebec, whereby this company will act as Cassiar agents in the sale of its product.

Continental Asbestos Co. Ltd.

Since the inception of this Company in 1950 with considerable investments by a group of American businessmen, mostly from the New England states, a mill of approximately 750 tons per day was erected and operated for a while in the development of the Continental Mine in Coleraine or until August 1st, 1952, when financial difficulties compelled a temporary suspension of this enterprise.

Faced with idleness, the Directors of Continental Asbestos Co., Ltd., acted promptly in response to an apparent urgent need for bulk mill tests in close proximity to numerous potential asbestos producers, and decided to make available its milling facilities for such purposes. On October 1, 1952 a contract was executed with the American Smelting & Refining Company for a period of four months and operations began promptly with a series of bulk rock tests evaluating the United Asbestos Corporation Limited mine at Black Lake. This contract was terminated on February 14, 1953 with gratifying results for all parties concerned.

On February 26, 1953 under an agreement previously arranged and for a period of 7 months or more a new project began with the Provincial Asbestos Company Ltd., processing rock from their properties in Coleraine prior to the erection of a 2,000 tons per day mill of their own. It is anticipated that this program of bulk mill tests will assist greatly in planning the new construction. The intricate problems of evaluating an asbestos ore deposit are well known to the industry. Both of these contracts were agreed upon on a "cost plus basis" and have proven a definite contribution to the industry.

Mr. A. P. Demers, General Manager of Continental states that it is the intention of his Company to continue these operations as long as there is demand, and at the same time resume the exploration and development of its own mine in the very near future.

Dominion Asbestos Mines

East of Asbestos, one newcomer to the production picture, the Dominion Asbestos Mines, began work early in 1952, on a 2,200-ton daily capacity mill to bring the company's property at St. Adrien, Quebec, into production. The new mill is expected to be in operation before the end of this year, and will cost about \$1,500,000.

Johnson's Company Ltd.

An important addition to the world's supply of high quality asbestos fibre will be made before the end of 1953, when the Megantic mine of the Johnson's Company starts operation. This property, brought into production by a company that has produced asbestos continuously since 1876, will turn out all grades of fibre from a mill that will handle, initially, 4,000 tons of rock per day.

A diamond drilling campaign that was probably one of the largest and most detailed in the history of the industry, proved the presence of an ore-body, sufficient to justify construction of a mill, altho the ore will give a lower percentage yield of asbestos than the company's present property at Thetford Mines. Altho the full extent of the ore-body is not known, an idea of its size may be gained from the fact that its surface area is approximately seven times that of the above-mentioned Thetford property, which, starting in a small way with the birth of the industry, has continued to grow and produce steadily for over seventy years.

Mining will be by the open pit method. Large diesel trucks will be used to transport the broken rock from the pit to the crusher.

Crushing and drying of the rock will follow standard practice in the industry but some new methods of extraction of fibre from the ore, of grading, fibre handling and storing of finished fibre will be incorporated into the milling process.

Nicolet Asbestos Mines, Limited

The year 1952 witnessed the largest production in the history of Nicolet Asbestos Mines. Further expansion is contemplated in 1953 with the installation of additional equipment for the production of special grades of asbestos shorts. In addition the company has plans for further

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exploratory work to add to its asbestos ore reserves.

Newfoundland Asbestos Limited

A mill with a minimum of 100 tons per day capacity is now being constructed at Lewis Brook by Newfoundland Asbestos Limited, and it is hoped to have construction completed and the mill in production early this year. A new motor road some eleven miles in length is being built from Point au Mal to the property which will replace the rugged tractor trail presently in use.

Provincial Asbestos Company, Ltd.

Directors of Provincial Asbestos Company, Ltd., at a recent meeting decided to proceed with development of the original No. 1 property as well as continuing with the present program at the Windsor pit. Operations lately have been concentrated at the Windsor pit where asbestos rock is being mined in anticipation of the commencement of milling operations at the leased Continental mill by March 1.

The development plans for both properties, located about one-half mile apart and situated some three miles south of the end of Black Lake, in Quebec's Eastern Twp., contemplate the erection of the company's own mill. Officials report that a substantial tonnage of commercial grade asbestos has been indicated by the drilling already completed on the two properties.

Exploration of the No. 1 property was started early last year and aroused the interest of a U. S. financing group which entered into negotiations to acquire the property. However, after studying the drill results and the engineer's report, the company decided to proceed with development work and terminated the discussion with the U. S. group some time ago. In the meantime work was started at the Windsor pit on the No. 2 property and arrangements were made to lease the Continental mill, located three miles away.

Troyseco Mines Ltd.

Current drilling activity on the asbestos property of Troyseco Mines Ltd. is meeting with favorable results. The property is located in Ham Nord, Que., approximately three miles from the property of Dominion Asbestos Mines, Ltd. Development work to date indicates an

asbestos-bearing serpentine body about 3,000 feet long, still open at both ends, by approximately 1,000 feet wide. Depth of 400 feet is known but is expected to extend deeper. Holes No. 9 and No. 10 recently completed, were in commercial asbestos ore for the full length of the core. Grades in both holes were from spinning to No. 7. At last report hole No. 11, a vertical hole between No. 9 and No. 10, was in ore to a depth of 168 feet.

It is the intention of the Company to maintain two drills in continuous operation to carry out a program of block drilling recommended by the Company's Consulting Engineer.

United Asbestos Corporation

Last September United Asbestos Corporation entered into an agreement with American Smelting & Refining Company which may result in some \$15 million being spent to bring United's Black Lake, Quebec, property into production on the basis of 4,000 tons daily.

A subsidiary of the American firm, Lake Asbestos of Quebec Ltd., would operate the property, with United receiving a substantial share of the profits. American Smelting was given a six-month period from last September to examine the project from every angle before deciding whether or not to go ahead. No announcement has been made as yet.

Mining asbestos from this deposit could be done in any of three ways: underground mining by the usual stoping methods; draining of Black Lake and underground mining by block caving, or open-pit mining involving both lake draining and removal of silt.

Van Packer Mines of Canada, Limited

Van Packer Mines of Canada, Limited, was incorporated in October, 1951, and is the successor of Teegana Mines, Limited. The capitalization is 4,000,000 preference shares of no par value, 3,944,200 preference shares of \$1 par value, issued to Teegana Mines, Limited, and 55,800 common shares of no par value.

The property consists of six claims in Deloro township, Porcupine area, district of Cochrane.

Teegana Mines, Limited, put up a concrete-block mill

British Columbia, Canada's asbestos production is provided entirely by Quebec's rich Eastern Townships deposits. There's plenty of asbestos exploration work going on, both there and in other parts of the country, and more new producers will probably be added to the list.

With new uses being turned up continually for this "freak" mineral it looks like a bright future for producers.

The Cape Asbestos Company Ltd.

The Cape Asbestos Company Limited of London, who have world wide interests in Asbestos products, announce that they have completed arrangements for the production of inorganic fibres from a natural rock, of which there are considerable deposits in Scotland.

William Kenyon & Sons Limited of Dunkinfield, Cheshire, the well-known firm of Heat Insulation Engineers, Rope and Textile Manufacturers, who have carried out extensive investigations into the manufacture and utilization of this new product, will act as sole distributors of the material, which will be marketed under the registered trade name of "Rocksil". The encouraging response to their initial approaches to a wide variety of markets has more than justified the decision to go into full scale commercial production.

The fibres manufactured from this indigenous material have a silken appearance, possess a very high tensile strength, and the long staples when made up into the form of mats offer a high resistance to the transmission

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of heat, cold and sound. The fibres can be produced to almost any degree of fineness and, in mass, assume an almost pure white appearance. They will withstand temperatures up to 1400° F. and will accordingly cover a very wide range of requirements in the Heat Insulation Industry.

Factory premises and land have been acquired in the town of Stirling, which has been chosen as the production site by reason of its close proximity to the raw materials and to the Clyde and neighboring Shipbuilding Industries, which it is expected will become large users of the product as the stringent regulations now in force in regard to fire resistance etc. on ships will be fully met.

Altho somewhat similar fibres have been produced in this country over a considerable period of time, the manufacture of this type of long staple fibre from indigenous rock has never before been conducted on a commercial scale, so that this project is actually a new industry for Britain.

Another prominent newcomer to Scotland sponsored by the Cape Asbestos Company Ltd. is its subsidiary, Marinite Limited, which has acquired large factory premises at Germiston, Glasgow, where an elaborate plant is being installed for the production of Marinite Boarding for ship joiner work. This Marinite Board is manufactured under a process initiated by the Johns-Manville Corporation in the United States, where it is almost universally applied in the American Shipbuilding Industry. It is intended that in the manufacture of this product, other materials indigenous to Britain shall be utilized and in addition it is expected that substantial quantities of rock fibres will be used in conjunction with the Marinite Boarding.

William Kenyon & Sons Limited of Dunkinfield are also developing the Diatomite deposits at Loch Cuithir on the Isle of Skye and are at present erecting factory buildings at Uig on the north west side of the Island with a view to refining the material and rendering it suitable to meet a wide range of applications.

These developments are of great interest to Britain.

and to Scotland in particular, as they may well set the course for more ambitious schemes for developing industry in Scotland.

BUILDING

The construction boom continued in March to tighten its grip on the prospect of setting another record high in 1953. According to F. W. Dodge Corporation the March figures for construction contract awards contained in the Dodge Reports carried the total for the first quarter to 11 per cent over the first quarter of 1952, in the 37 states east of the Rockies.

For March the residential figure was the star among the Dodge classifications with a total of \$605,200,000, up 45 per cent over February and 2 per cent above March 1952.

The three-month total reached \$3,444,696,000. Dodge's March reports totaled \$1,347,518,000, up 32 per cent over February and 2 per cent over March 1952.

Nonresidential awards in March were \$449,175,000 or 20 per cent more than February but 3 per cent less than March 1952. Heavy engineering (public works and utilities) totaled \$293,143,000 or 28 per cent more than February and 11 per cent more than March 1952.

Other three-month 1953 figures compared with three months 1952 were: Non-residential, \$1,230,410,000, up 10 per cent; residential, \$1,483,804,000, up 12 per cent; heavy engineering, \$730,482,000, up 11 per cent.

MARKET CONDITIONS

GENERAL BUSINESS.

Current business continues good to excellent. The general feeling is one of optimism for at least the next six months. However, this feeling is tempered by knowledge that defense spending has probably reached a peak; that sales of used cars have been slow and this may be a forerunner of a drop in sales and production of new cars and other consumer durables; and that total personal incomes have levelled off. Business and financial circles seem to feel that maintenance of present levels of production is unlikely and we may expect a return to considerably more competition for the consumer's dollar before the year's end.

ASBESTOS — RAW MATERIAL.

A noticeable pick-up in the demand for asbestos was evident beginning about the first of April. This is due in considerable extent to the opening of navigation and consequent export shipments.

The over-all demand picture is somewhat spotty. Group 3 is still in very short supply. Certain special types of 7 Group or Shorts are also in relatively tight supply.

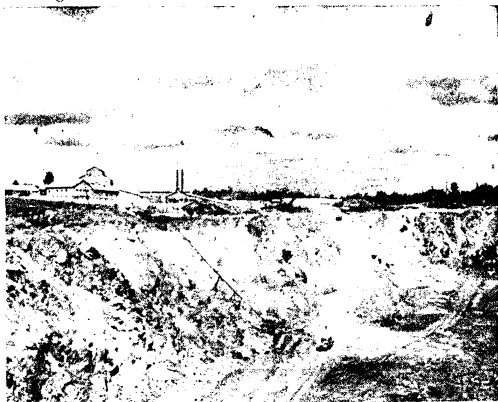
The demand for the 4 Group materials about meets supply whereas the 5 and 6 Group fibres are in ample supply.

The U. S. demand is running down about in line with last year but the export demand is definitely down.

Asbestos Textiles. Some improvement in asbestos tape demand has been experienced, even tho supply continues to be greater than demand. There is being experienced a falling-off in demand of medium and fine cut cloths, but a greater demand exists for heavier cloths.

Asbestos Brake Lining. The replacement market in friction materials shows an increase of about 4% for the first two months of this year compared with the same period last year. The equipment market is well up due to stepped up production.

Asbestos Paper. There has been an unusually large demand for commercial paper which should run fairly heavy for the next several months. The *Millboard* market is substantially ahead of 1952 and heavier volume is expected for the balance of the year. There is a moderate demand for *Saturated Paper* but due to seasonal requirements an increased demand is expected.

Insulation, High Pressure. There is excess capacity in the industry in relation to present demand; this is particularly true with block insulation. New orders are spotty and there is no appreciable backlog. With the industrial program drawing to a close there is little new work to be figured, altho this should be partially offset by the increased amount of commercial work.

Insulation, Low Pressure. The demand for low pressure insulation continues very large and might very well exceed quantities used during 1952, since an increase in volume is expected as a result of proposed housing project.

Asbestos Cement Products. There has been a steady seasonal pick-up on siding during the past few weeks; the demand increasing for color.

The market continues good for corrugated and flat, and expects to improve due to seasonal requirements.

There has been a slight increase in the market for Pressure and Sewer pipe, Flue pipe, Building Sewer pipe and Electrical Conduit sales are feeling the effects of the increased seasonal demand.

The above comments have been made by various informed executives in the industry. All comments are welcome.

THIS AND THAT

Corrugated mats made of especially compounded rubber links woven on 12 gauge spring steel wire, have been developed by the General Scientific Equipment Co., 2700 W. 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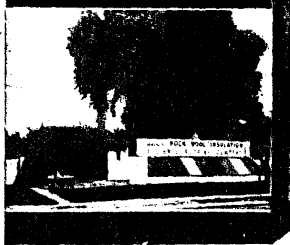

NOTES FROM ARIZONA ASBESTOS PRODUCERS

Association—Newsletter—April 1953

Roger Q. Kyle, dean of Arizona asbestos miners, started his career in Arizona asbestos in June 1915 making him the oldest producer of the Arizona Asbestos Producers Association. Mr. Kyle located his Sloan Creek Asbestos mines in the year 1915. At that time there were no roads into the mountainous Cherry Creek district. The ore was packed out and supplies packed in by burro train some 80 miles to the mines. There is still a pressing need for a better road into this district of which several of the Association members have mines.

The Metate Asbestos Corp. and D. W. Jaquays Mining Corp. were the first companies to sell to the government stock pile in Globe. Both companies plan to repeat again during April, along with Geo. W. Kohl of the American Asbestos Company.

Sorsen & Williams Mining Co. reports they are driving two exploration tunnels and are in 70 feet with one and 50 feet with another. Results are encouraging altho they are running into very heavy ground which requires considerable timbering.

Bear Canyon Mining Co. reports they are in 228 feet where they encountered diabase and immediately started their cross cut which is in 140 feet. Some fibre is being picked up in the North cross cut.

The Metate Asbestos Corp. reports they drifted 75 feet in diabase and diamond drilled an additional 101 feet without encountering any lime formation. Project was terminated.

D. W. Jaquays Mining Co. is making progress with drifting at the Canadian mine. Too early for a definite trend yet.

Increased production of asbestos is expected to result from the construction of a proposed 30-mile access road in the Sierra Ancha district north of Globe. An application for its construction is now pending and a reconnaissance survey has just been completed. If approved, the highway would be built by the Bureau of public roads and financed by the Defense Materials Production Administration.

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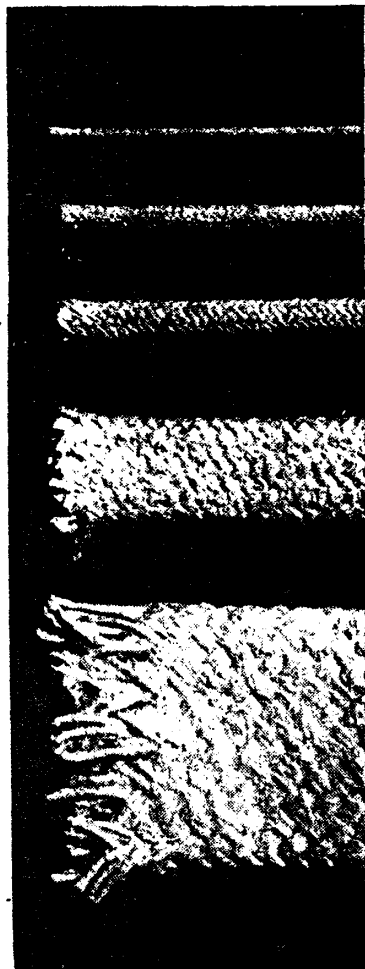

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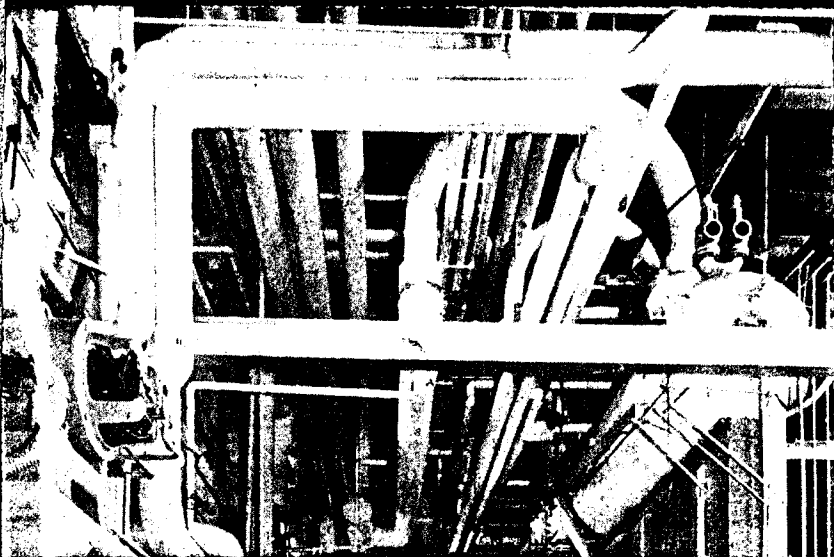
