Burton's 'Hamlet' This Week

Richard Burton's "Hamlet," heralded as one of the great attractions in the history of the Broadway stage, will open a four-showing engagement at the State Theater in Monterey beginning tomorrow. The picture is brought here through the revolutionary new electronic-optical process of Electronivision Theatre film.

The four screenings of the Warner Bros. presentation will take place in the afternoon and evening, tomorrow and Thursday. There will be no other performances thereafter.

Seats are not reserved but the number of tickets sold for each performance does not exceed the capacity of the theater, thereby guaranteeing a seat to each ticket holder. Ticket prices are \$2 general admission and \$2.50 for loge.

One thousand theaters throughout the United States and Canada will join in presenting the film of Burton's once-in-a-lifetime interpretation of "Hamlet" these same two days.

Starring with Burton in "Hamlet" are Hume Cronyn, Alfred Drake, Eileen Herlie, William Redfield, George Rose and George Voskovec.

The production, staged by John Gielgud, was acclaimed on Broadway.

General admission tickets still are available at the box office of the theater.

Water Board Accepts Resignation of Cowan

Directors of the Monterey Peninsula Municipal Water District last night accepted the resignation of Director Jack Cowan of Carmel Valley.

In a letter, Cowan said that he was moving to Grass Valley.

The resignation was the highlight of a 20-minute meeting in the Seaside Professional Building. However, following the business session, the board met in executive session for an extra half hour to consider a replacement for Cowan.

No agreement on a replacement was reached but Board President Ed Coffin of Pacific Grove said he would try to come up with a name in a few days. If he is able to find a suitable appointee, Coffin said he would call a special meeting of the board to take action on the matter.

Although the meeting was the first regular session for the board in two months, the agenda was very brief. The reason is simple. The board is still awaiting a decision from the Public Utilities Commission on the all-important question of the value of Peninsula holdings of California Water and Telephone Co. and East Monterey Water Service of Seaside.

Board counsel Myron Haas said that when the decision is received—hopefully in about two weeks—the board should consider

holding of an immediate special meeting.

Meanwhile, the district staff including Haas, special counsel Martin McDonough of Sacramento and engineer C. T. Mess of San Francisco will meet to advise the board as to what the commission means if there is any portion of the decision that requires clarification," Haas said.

Haas said that in view of the complexity of the Monterey Peninsula case, he assumes that the PUC decision will be very detailed.

The board also paid bills. To date, the board has accumulated a total indebtedness of \$750,000 in its six-year effort to determine the fair market value of privately-owned water systems on the Peninsula and the feasibility of public acquisition of such systems.

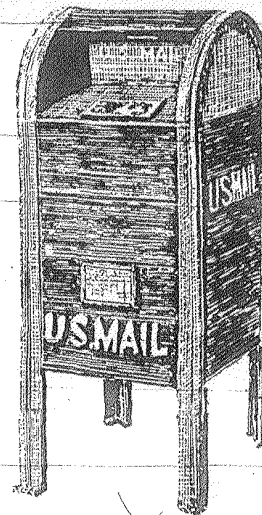
