North Carolina's Tar Heels held on to third place, drawing 46 first place ballots and 1,568 points. The Golden Bears, who brushed past Washington, 21-0, gained 13 first place votes and piled up 1,239 points. Army, which turned back previously unbeaten Cornell, 27-6, drew four first place ballots and wound up with 1,214 points.

Georgia Tech finished with 929 points and one first place vote. The Yellow Jackets rolled over Florida, 42-7. Penn., 20-14 conquerors of Navy, drew 505 points.

MOVE UP

Missouri's Tigers moved up from ninth place to eighth, replacing Penn State. Missouri, which turned back Iowa State 49-7, drew 386 points. Penn State held to a 14-14 tie by Michigan State, dropped out of the top ten to 12th place. It was the first blotch on the Nittany Lions record after having swept aside all regular season opposition since 1946. Northwestern moved up from tenth to ninth place. The Wildcats, 48-0 victors over Syracuse, polled 325 points.

Nevada's surprising Wolf Pack, 15th a week ago, took over tenth place on the strength of their 65-14 trouncing of Tulsa. Nevada gained three first place votes and drew 297 points.

Oregon was ranked 14th with 82 points.
