OBJECTIVES OF THE COURSE

The change of concept from the mere detection and treatment of disease to the prevention of any adverse effect on workers requires that even the "part-time" physician must provide more than physical examinations and emergency treatment of injuries. Physicians affiliated with industry must now be prepared, and competent, to counsel employees and to advise and consult with management. They will require a familiarity with labor relations and the economic aspects of absenteeism, labor turnover, and the various insurance programs. The course will offer instruction in these and related areas.
